### A RESOLUTION.

A special meeting of the Village Board was held in the Village hall on Monday evening, March 8th, 1920. John Walter was elected Pres. pro tem. Roll was called and the following members were present. John Walter, H. E. Trager, D. L. Bester, E. A. Murphy. The following resolution was passed by a vote of the board:

Whereas, the Mazo Poultry and Egg Co. by its President Carl Fries and Secretary Wm. H. Wurster and Lorenz Wolf and Ester Wolf, this wife, did on the fifteenth day of February, 1920, file with Chas. T. Davies, clerk of the Village of Mazomanie, Wisconsin, their application in writing to the Village Board of said Village for the vacating and discontinuance of an alley running north and south through block fourteen (14) and lying between lots four (4) and five (5) of said block, beginning at Crescent street and terminating at the rail road tracks, and whereas duly filed a notice of said application in the office of the Clerk of said Village of Mazomanie, and whereas the Village Board of said Village by resolution duly passed on the fifteenth (15) day of February 1920, ordered that said application and the matter therein contained be heard at a special meeting of the said Village Board to be held in the Village hall in said Village on Monday March eighth (8), 1920, at 8 o'clock p. m. and at least one week before said meeting the clerk of said village give notice thereof by publication and by posting said notice in three public places in the village, stating therein when the said petition would be acted upon and what alley was proposed to be vacated, and whereas, as appears from due proof thereof on file with the said Village Clerk, the said notice was duly given by publication and posting the same in three public places.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the alley running north and south through block fourteen (14) and lying between lots four (4) and five (5) of said block, beginning at Crescent street and the same is hereby vacated and discontinued.
