Marriage Out of State Held Legal.

Definite assurance of the legality of marriages outside of the state was given by the supreme court Tuesday in its decision reversing the lower court's annulment of the marriage of Stella Michaelson and Earl Lyman, a Wisconsin couple married in Michigan.

The theory of the decision is that where the marriage is legal in the state where it is consummated, no legislation in another state can make it illegal. This is substantially the position taken by the attorney general's department and various state and private organizations which have called attention to the tangle in which hundreds of Wisconsin families would be involved if any other interpretation were given.

The opinion was written by Judge E. C. Sawyer. It is held that this marriage license law as contained in the statutes cannot be considered as having any extrajurisdiction effect and therefore as not affecting the marriage here because of the law.
