We have long feared for it, and this letter (dated February 12, 1920) from a lady with the American Missions in Turkey, transmitted through the kindness of Miss Florence Baldwin of New York, confirms the cruelty of our apprehensions."

"Do you remember my friends in Russia, the Poldines? The Bolsheviks killed two of the sons and put Mr. and Mrs. Poldine on a little place, and made Mrs. Poldine work the ground for a living. Mr. Poldine was too old and ill to help. Then they came and killed Mr. Poldine, and later killed Mrs. Poldine. It seems unbelievable. They were such charming people and were such good friends of mine. Only one son escaped, and he was away. He is in the 'White Army,' and I should think he would feel like fighting until his last breath to stop this terrible condition in Russia."

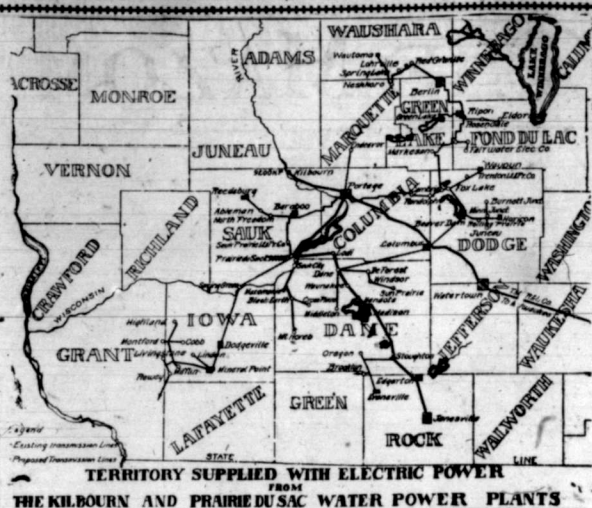

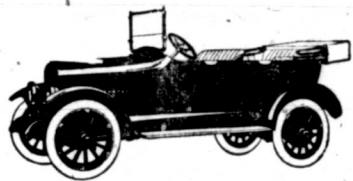
