Notice to Dog Owners

To all Dog Owners:
You are hereby notified that it is necessary for every dog owner to secure a license at the clerk's office of the city, town or village in which his dog is kept before the thirtieth day of June, 1920.

The license can be secured by making application by mail to G. L. Dunlap, Mazomanie, Wis., or applying in person. At the same time the dog owner must deposit the fee of \$3.00 plus 15 cents for each male dog, and \$5.00 plus 15 cents for each female dog which he owns.

On July 1, 1920, the New Dog Law goes into effect.

To not delay. Make application for license at once. No extension after July 6, 1920.

When application is made by mail, name, breed, sex, color and markings of dog must be given.

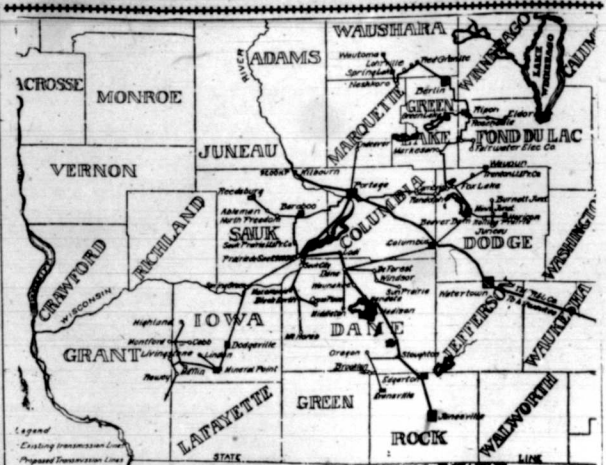

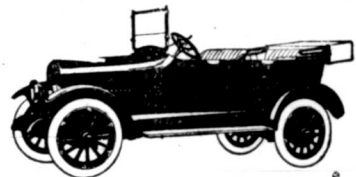
