## Phillips Refused.

Colonel Gilbert, Edward Souman of Milwaukee, veteran of two wars and characterized by Senator Burnett in the nomination speech as "a real soldier instead of a tin one," was endorsed by the conference of Wisconsin Republicans as candidate for republican nomination for governor in the university gymnasium Wednesday afternoon. Final action on his name was taken only after an insistent demand for "Governor Phillips for a fourth term" had been allied by three separate personal refusals by the governor himself.

Refused to consider candidates for other offices, endorsement of the republican national platform, enthusiastic approval of Senator Harding for president, support for the deep waterway from the great lakes to the Atlantic seaboard, a tribute to the record of Governor Phillips, and recommendation that the Volstead act be amended to permit the manufacture and sale of beverages "not in fact intoxicating within the meaning of the 18th amendment," were among the principal acts of the conference.

## Utah Man Heads New Party.

Perley P. Christensen, Salt Lake City lawyer, was nominated as the presidential candidate for the new farmer-labor party in the convention at Chicago, at 2:30 Thursday morning. Christensen, a 48-year-old, was chosen on the second ballot over Dudley Malone, of New York, by a vote of 192.5 to 174.6. Max S. Hayes, of Cleveland Ohio, was nominated for vice-president.

Robert M. La Follette, Jr., appeared on the platform and announced that his father had informed him over the telephone that circumstances had arisen which prevented him from accepting the nomination by this convention and asked that it be withdrawn immediately.

## Chief Justice Winslow Dead.

Continuous service for 29 years on the highest judicial bench in the state, the achievement of a man who has the rank of one of the greatest of American jurists and who has left his impress on the policies of the state by his participation in more than 10,000 opinions, was terminated Tuesday by the death of Chief Justice John Bradley Winslow. The death occurred at the home, 121 Laughaun street, Madison after an illness of several months with intestinal trouble.

## War Relics from Overseas.

Congressman James Monahan, of this district, including Crawford, Richland, Grant, Iowa, Dane, Lafayette and Green counties, has secured a large collection of war relics from overseas, which must be of great interest to all of us. About six hundred of these will in due time come to Dane county. Mr. Monahan has been in Madison to consult with some of those who are interested in the matter. In a meeting with him the following named persons were appointed to act as a committee to consider the matter of a proper distribution of these relics and souvenirs: T. G. Lingard, chairman of the county board, chairman; Hosen W. Root, secretary; Colonel John G. Salzman, E. J. Castle, Mayor Milo Kittleson, Major George O'Connell, Mrs. J. W. Hobbs, Mrs. C. Z. Wise and George A. Boland.

This committee at a later meeting held by them, decided to call a public meeting of the members of the county board, members of the American Legion, the Grand Army and its allied patriotic organizations, and all other persons who are interested in this matter, at Grand Army Memorial Hall in the capital at 2:30 o'clock Tuesday, July 15, to talk about the offer of distributing these interesting war relics. There should be a large attendance at this meeting. We are all interested in the visible tokens of the heroic and victorious struggle over there. Come to this meeting.
