Republican Candidates File Papers.

Twenty-six republican candidates for Dane county offices filed their nomination papers with County Clerk Fjeldstad Tuesday, but the doors of the clerk's office were locked at five without a single democratic candidate appearing formally in the field. Mr. Fjeldstad declared that he would accept any papers which were placed under his door before twelve o'clock Tuesday night, but not a single democratic candidate filed.

Dr. Kester Writes About Trip.

Editor Swan and Friends:

Leaving Mazomanie July 20th for an automobile trip, we drove through twenty-three counties of Wisconsin, viz.: Dane, Jefferson, Waukesha, Milwaukee, Ozaukee, Shelburne, Manitowish, Keweenaw, Brown, Door, Outagamie, Waupesa, Shawano, Marathon, Lincoln, Price, Kauka, Chippewa, Eau Claire, Jackson, Monroe, Juneau, and Sauk. Dane county was pretty dry when we left, but still more so when we returned. The eastern counties are breeding rain more than we do, but during the early part of summer the lake counties were extremely wet.

Land through eastern Dane, Jefferson, and Waukesha counties is valued from \$250 to \$300 per acre where contiguous to a running factory. And by the way, if we had a running factory in Mazomanie, it would increase the value of land within five miles of Mazomanie from \$250 to \$350 per acre.

Staying over night and the next forenoon in a suburb of Milwaukee, I noticed across the street dirt being excavated for a basement. Strolling over, I talked with the contractor, who was a Polek. He told me he was running eight teams of his own, giving the drivers and shovelers \$6.00 per day. He said he came to this country (Milwaukee) twenty years ago and was owning \$2000. I asked him how much he had got ahead now, and he said \$15,000.00 anyway. "Then you think this a pretty good country?" "Oh yes! You bet. I'm going back to Poland; I am an American. But this government so did right when she took our good beer away and gave us soap." This illustrates the foreigner's idea of prohibition, and it will take the coming generation to eradicate it. But the benefits of prohibition are more noticeable in the great mill towns—paper mills, saw mills, etc. Before the eradication of the saloon, workmen were always in debt at the Company's store, and fighting and brawling was the daily, or rather, nightly occurrence. Now the working man is clothing and feeding his family and building his own home. Jails are empty, accidents are less frequent, and workmen much more reliable. But here's a pretty good whiskey story: An Irishman and a Swede were running Jacks. The Irishman offered the Swede a bottle and says "Have a drink of squirrel whiskey." The Swede then goes to town and asks for a bottle of squirrel whiskey. The dealer says, "I haven't got squirrel whiskey, but I have Old Crow." The Swede says, "By jingling Christmas, I just want to you; around a little. I don't want to be."

Wednesday afternoon we drove up the 140 miles. All along the lake shore drive, towns, villages, or cities are not more than four to six miles apart with one or two small houses (defunct saw-lots) in between. Grass and grain crops are very fine along this line, but corn is very backward. Land worth \$200 to \$300 per acre, the principal industry being dairying and raising cane-line products.

Thursday we drove through Door county, up one side of the peninsula and down the other, Sturgeon Bay being the principal city of the county, and the center of the great cherry industry being dairying and raising cane-line products. We visited one orchard of 1,000 acres where they were running 600 pickers. Many cherries are canned in a local cannery, and many more are shipped all over the United States. Raisers are getting there \$3.50 to \$3.75 a crate at the shipping point. Land selling with from \$100 per acre up to \$1,000 per acre improved and orchards in bearing. Soil of Door county is clay and gravel with more stones than soil. Roads everywhere from Milwaukee north and northern part of state are like a bowl of soup. All it is necessary to do is to ditch on sides, throw up a turpentine in the center and smooth down, and you have a road that makes autobots smile. Men who travel over macadam roads can see the expensive folly of such material. Unless you can pay the price and have concrete roads, clay and gravel is the only road material.

The country adjacent to Green Bay is as old as any farming country in the state. Crops good, land selling up to \$300 per acre. Country from Green Bay, northwest to Wausau is under a fine state of cultivation, but land badly infested with Canada thistles. Land in central and northern Wisconsin will soon look like a vast prairie and cheap land will soon be a thing of the past, selling now from \$75 to \$300 per acre. Small grain and grasses were fine everywhere. Clover and timothy are indigenous to the soil wherever you get the brush off. Pine stumps? Well, I guess I won't say anything about them, for the closer was trying to grow up and hide them. Stones? Oh, my! Some places there weren't many, at 4 other places enough to fill up Lake Michigan. But in all northern Wisconsin the public, municipal and school bus lines will put the southern part of the state in the shade.

After you leave Lake Michigan going north and west, corn is just as big and as far advanced as it is here. Grade dairy cows are worth from \$100 to \$150 everywhere. Good horses, and

you see good ones selling from \$200 to \$250. In all we traveled about 1,000 miles using sixty-two gallons of gasoline at an average cost of thirty-three cents per gallon. Respectfully,

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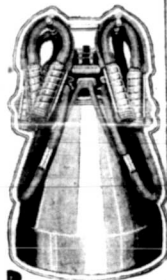
