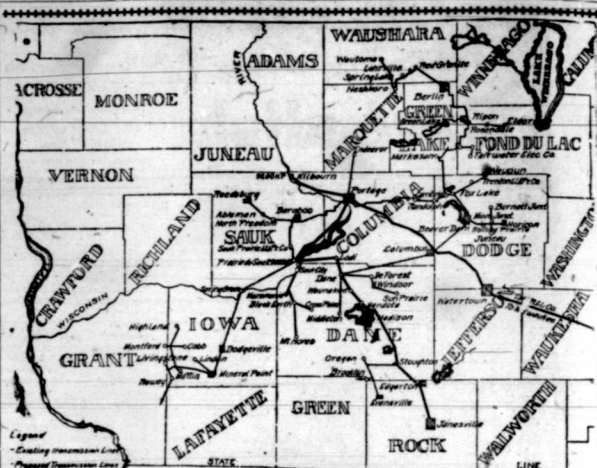

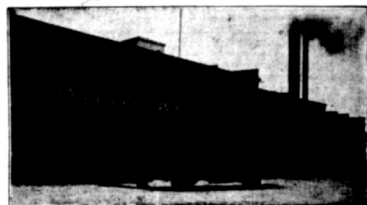

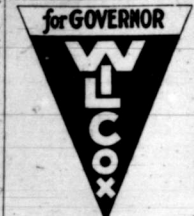

—John Borman, of Madison, a son-in-law of H. G. Rasmussen, of this place, and companion, C. W. Monroe, also of Madison, were drowned about 500 feet from shore at Merrill Springs, Lake Mendota, Wednesday afternoon, when their rowboat capsized as they stood up to change places. Neither could swim. Albert Rasmussen, a brother-in-law of Borman, saw the capsized boat from shore and rushed to their aid in another boat, but both had sunk from view when he reached the spot. The water was about fifteen feet deep, and the bottom is overgrown with weeds. Mrs. Borman, who with a sister, was bathing in the lake, also witnessed the accident. Mrs. Emory Oldenberg, another sister, who with her two children had been visiting at the parental home here, left for her home in Madison on the afternoon train, Wednesday, and H. G. Rasmussen and son, Harry, drove to Merrill Springs in the afternoon to visit the camp, but neither saw or knew anything of the accident when they left this place. Search for the bodies of the drowned men was carried on Wednesday night and Thursday, but at last reports had not been discovered. Borman was thirty-two years of age, and is survived by his wife, who was formerly Miss Jennie Rasmussen. His companion was twenty-three years of age.
