Immediately preceding the ceremony, a duet, "I Love You Truly," was beautifully rendered by Helen and Irene.

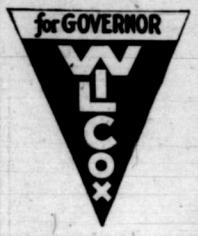

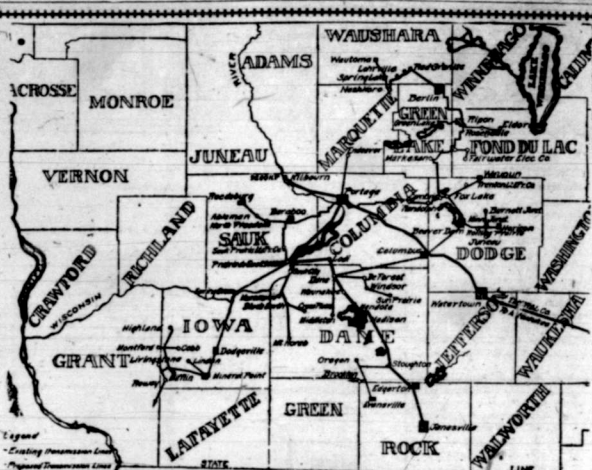
