**Inventor of Binder Honored By Medals.**—Two medals presented to John P. Appleby, Wisconsin inventor of the grain binder, at the Paris exposition are now on exhibit in the state historical museum, the gift of Mr. Appleby's widow. The inventor lived in Mazomanie, and his early work on the invention was done in the state.

It is not generally known that after the world-wide adoption of his grain binder, Mr. Appleby set himself to the task of lessening the drudgery of cotton picking and succeeded, Mrs. Appleby says. He worked at the problem persistently for ten years, visited foreign lands and studied all the patents and ideas ever issued or tried. He finally had perfected a machine so simple that young girls have driven it without difficulty, harvesting hundreds of acres of cotton and doing the work with one team and the machine, of twenty-field hands.

## OBITUARY

### Mrs. Frank Singula.

Mrs. Mary Singula died Saturday evening, October 25, 1920, at 9:30 o'clock, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Mary Milne, Merrill, Wis. Death was due to valvular heart trouble and came unexpectedly, as the patient had been up and around Saturday. The illness was of two years' standing.

Mrs. Singula had been in Merrill the past two months. She was born in Bolesia, June 3, 1859, her maiden name being Miss Mary Contain. She came to the United States as a young lady and immediately located in the state of Wisconsin, at Muscola, Grant county. Later she lived at Camp Douglas, and at the time of her death had been a resident of Mazomanie for many years. She was married to Frank Singula January 2, 1878, at Highland, Iowa county. Two children were born to the union, seven of whom are living, Frank of Janesville; Joseph, of Kenosha; Eleanor, of Chicago; Frances Pegrahl, of Saunders, Minn.; Mary Milne, of Merrill; Emma, of Johnson City, Tenn.; and Anna, of Minnesota. The survivors are the foregoing, also their father, Frank Singula, thirteen grandchildren, two brothers and one sister in Bohemia.

The funeral service was held at Merrill, Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock, at St. Francis Xavier church, Rev. John Owen officiating. Following the service the remains were taken to Madison where they were interred beside the remains of a son, Van Singula, who died two years ago. ## Election Side Lights.

Harding's plurality by popular vote is several millions.

There were no democratic candidates for office on the House county ticket. The entire republican ticket carried in House county, with majorities up to 15,000.

Wisconsin went on record in favor of the Muller act by a vote of at least six to one.

Victor Berger, the unseated congressman, was defeated in the fifth Milwaukee district by several thousand votes. Among new democratic casualties were the defeat of Champ Clark of

Missouri, present democratic leader in the house, and the election of a republican congressman from Texas.

Harding's plurality in Wisconsin over Cox, according to latest figures, is 310,000; Blaine's over McCoy, 51,000; Leacock's over Thompson, 45,000. Morgan and the balance of the republican state officers were elected by large majorities.

The present indications are that Harding has carried all but these eleven states: Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Texas, and Virginia. This will give Harding 494 electoral votes, with 127 for Cox.


