No Barracks In Capitol Park.

Thirty-five Wisconsin state officials will, January 1, be moved from the Capitol to the Overland building at the foot of King street and will occupy that place for a period of five years.

This announcement was made last night by M. F. Blumenthal, custodian of public property, who, with a committee of the Madison Association of Commerce, headed by President C. B. Chapman, has been negotiating for additional office room made necessary by the congested condition in the Capitol.

Break Production Records.

American farm broke production records of five crops this year. Preliminary estimates announced by the department of agriculture show that the corn, tobacco, rice, sweet potatoes and pear crops surpassed in size those of any previous year in the country's history. In addition very large crops were grown in some instances closely approaching records, of oats, barley, rye, potatoes, apples and hay. Black wheat production records, however, have stood since 1866 with this year's crop more than 8,000,000 bushels under it. Final crop production figures will be announced next month. Corn, king of all crops, reported the enormous total of 3,190,126,000 bushels. That is 75,000,000 bushels more than ever before grown in any year.

Quarrying To Cease At Devil's Lake Park.

After 15 years of effort on the part of the state, negotiations were completed Tuesday to take the American Refractories Co., operating the quarry in the state park at Devil's Lake, out of the park limits. The company is to remove its operations on or before January 1, 1922.

It will conduct its quarrying there after on what has been known as the Goldman property, completely outside of the state park.

The state paid the company \$75,000 for its 40 acres of property at Devil's lake. All buildings and improvements go to the state. In addition to the cash payment, 57 acres outside the park limits is conveyed to the company.

Holstein Cow Gives Birth To Triplets.

Birchwood, Wis.—One of the most unusual freaks of nature that has come to light in Dunn county is the birth of a set of triplets to a Holstein cow on the Nels Tilleman farm near Monmouth in the town of Red Cedar. The first calf weighed 84 pounds, the second 42 pounds and the third 41 pounds. Their total weight was 167 pounds. The mother is a 2-year-old heifer.

Gravel Roads Suggested.

Declaring that the funds available for road building in Dunn county, if expended on concrete highways, are not sufficient to construct the mileage needed to remedy conditions in this county, A. R. Hild, state highway engineer, is suggesting that postponement of contemplated concrete work be ordered by the county board at its fall meeting this week, and that the money be used on gravel road construction and in grading, draining, culverting and bridging county highways at needed points.

conditions in schools.

3. To provide adequately trained

teachers.

4. To make possible a high school

education for every child.

5. To convince the public of the

worth of education.

6. To interest all citizens in school

needs.

7. To obtain adequate financial

support for schools.

8. To make all school instruction

contribute to good citizenship

and personal efficiency.


