The Farmers' Institute at Mazomanie—This is the fiftieth year of Farmers' Institutes in Wisconsin, the first state in the Union to establish this particular form of agricultural education. One of the "Institutes" this anniversary year will be held at Mazomanie on January 15 and 16.

There are several live subjects to discuss. Feeds are high, milk and butter off are rather low in price. How shall we feed now? Summer pastures are not what they used to be. The dairy cow and the horse need rain during the dry days pastures. 1000 per head of sweet corn—how about growing a crop to raise price with no summer for volume feeding? Then, too, the farmers who have started with alfalfa seem to be pretty well fixed to feed cheaply in those times when purchased feeds are high.

"The board cows" which produce at high cost the milk which causes overproduction are raising the price of the dairy products. Should the farmer not, through conservation set a larger measure of control upon the standardization and marketing of dairy products? Are we not rather laconic story repeated on our farms just as some states are cotton legislation or wheat legislation? Do we not need to diversify our farms a little more in originality? A lot of these questions will be discussed at the Institutes at Mazomanie. The Institutes are for men and women, boys and girls. All come and add your bit.
