

MIKE IS ECONOMICAL EDUCATOR FOR CHILDREN

"Mike the Milk Kid" children do the best work at school.

Children maintain better health, better teeth, and are better able to keep up with their classes when they drink milk at home and at school. Mike has done much for the promotion of milk and schoolchildren's nutrition in a recent article. —Mike, Milwaukee schools by Mrs. Irene Luther Grinn, home economics specialist, and Mrs. Nellie Kehde Jones, state leader of home economics extension. Milk can do much for every Wisconsin school child.

Before the school milk campaign from 20 to 30 per cent of the children were underweight. The home school and the children then about 80 per cent and talkative then about 90. Each child can drink milk once a month, and it is not long before the children begin to gain.

The "repetitive" or the child who does not make his grade, is often the child who is underweight. Since "repeating" means an extra cost to the state, it is very necessary to reduce the number of underweight children. Milk drinking is thus an economical as well as a healthy measure.

During the five months of the Milwaukee study, 75 children who had had a forenoon lunch of one cup of milk and a sandwich, and who reported that they drank two to four cups of milk at home each day, showed an average of one and one-fourth pounds in five months. The normal 2400 calorie meal conditions to one and one-half pounds.
