SIDELIGHTS ON THE LEGISLATURE

Madison, April 28.—Some auto! Secretary of State Zimmerman has transmitted to the two houses, in response to resolution, a list of motor cars owned by the various departments, and the record shows just 541. Nine are operated by prohibition officials and 19 are owned at the University while eight are owned at the state prison. More are used by the conservation commission, 28, and the dairy and food department runs 22. For a time 263, most of all are kept busy by the highway commission. Many trucks are in the category, one, a so-called Diamond T, costing \$4,495. A Kissel freighter is catalogued at \$2,625, while there is a Paige sedan at \$2,284, a Marmon for the adjutant general at \$3,271.50, including a driver for three months, a Pierce-Arrow truck at \$4,000, an Apperson at \$4,500. Secretary Zimmerman himself drives his own little car, confiding freely between capital and metropolis, while State Treasurer Leighton gets about in the same simple twined as truce by him in herpod. The attorney general has not forgotten state aid in motoring, but the governor has a car by special act of the legislature, and he needs it. Fifty-nine other offices and departments have no state cars charged to them. The resolution regarded data of gross interest, and never before elicited.

"Speaking of 'cars', here's an instance where their narcotic attraction operated in a somewhat unusual manner. I stepped into the saloon of a local company handling a good car for the purpose of making a purchase. "Wait while I get a match," remarked the pallid salesman, and away he hurried, coffin-nail in hand. Ere long he returned, leisurely struck a light, took a resigned draught, but I had lost interest. A different car was ordered in another garage where customers are not left standing on one foot while out-of-door smoke weakly yield to the stupefactive urge.

"If all railways are not made artificial," observed Henry Johnson, former state treasurer, "then automatic bags should guard every crossing. There's no need of wardens. I can't believe that bare operators electrically are not entirely feasible." "Close by his home across Lake Monona in South Madison two young men were killed recently while taking a chance to lead a passenger train. "Certainly a practical device to make crossings safe must be possible. And without undue expense to the railroads." Senator Truax of Nevada also revealing after a dangerous crossing, "would require all accidents to cease, but the notion has not yet won larger favor.

"Still, after all, how really great is the danger when probably millions of freighter, motor trucks are made daily in this country with accidents so frequent as to be insignificant in number. 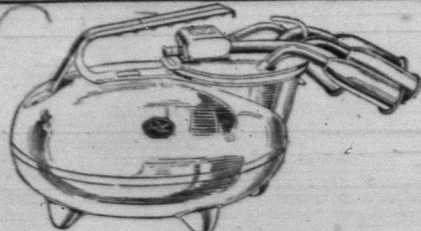

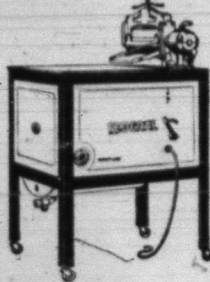
