SIDELIGHTS ON THE LEGISLATURE

(Continued from last week)

After debating a bill for the establishment of an old age pension system optional with the counties, the assembly adjourned Saturday evening, 11, to meet Monday. The act provides that no county can adopt the plan except by a two-thirds vote of the county board. Indigent persons who have lived in the county for over fifteen years, aged 70 years of age, may be granted a pension of \$1 a day, the expense to be shared equally by state and county. Inmates of private charitable institutions are not eligible for the award, though a diligent eight, unprofitably employed, was granted a pension to persons to pass 65 years of age to the institutions. Mrs. Helen M. Brooks of the Green Lakes-Waukesha district, herself a Methodist, was one who fearlessly called attention to this phase of the case and to the fact that the estates of inmates in the Methodist home at least, must go to such homes, penitentiaries and all. Two of the dozen amendments are due to Paul H. Rainey of Chippewa. He introduced the amendment against the bill. Assembyman Robert Caldwell of Lodi bitterly characterized such legislation as the worst ever presented to a Wisconsin legislature. He demanded an ay-no vote, declaring every member should be put on record as those favoring such a measure. Other legislators, he said, wanted to increase the age to 65 or 70 years, increase the amount to make it compulsory upon counties to adopt the pension system. The senate at once acquiesced in the assembly's amendments and just about the time this is read the bill will have been signed, published and become a law. County boards, at their first sessions, probably will proceed, by resolution, formally to regulate the innovation. The charge has been made that it is projected for Milwaukee's railroads.

The senate passed a bill introduced by Senator Herman J. Severson of Iron which will prevent the prison and military bell being held in the state house. The measure prohibits any function, whether social or otherwise, in the capitol when a charge is demanded. Probably no where else in this country have bells been given in so malignant environment. It may be feared that the assembly will concur.

By a vote of 71 to 19 the house concurred in the Senate's resolution asking the president to direct the state department not to foster financial arrangements between citizens of this country and foreign governments which might lead to "aid" from our enemies. Senator Severson said, addressing the assembly, told of millions of dollars used to corrupt the czars, governments throughout the world war, a ruler aboard enough whatever the source.

The senate advanced the socialist bill providing for cooperative liability in damage actions. Under the




