SIDELIGHTS ON THE LEGISLATURE

(Continued from last week)

After devoting a bill for the establishment of an old age pension system optional with the counties, the assembly advanced the measure to enactment, 71 to 25. The act provides that no county can adopt the plan except by a two-thirds vote of the county board. Indigent persons who have lived in the county for not less than 10 years, over 70 years of age, may be granted a pension of \$1 a day, the expense to be shared equally by state and county. Inmates of private charitable institutions are not eligible for the award, though a significant light, suspiciously ecclesiastical, was made to permit such persons to pass it over at once to the institutions. Mrs. Helen M. Brooks of the Green Lake-Wausau district, herself a Methodist, was one who fearlessly called attention to this phase of the case and to the fact that the estates of inmates in the Methodist home at Wausau, used to go to such homes, pensions and all two of the deplorable amendments are due to Paul H. Rahlke of Chippewa. He inaugurated the medical crusade against the bill. American Robert Caldwell of Lodi formerly characterized such legislation as the worst ever presented to a Wisconsin legislature. He demanded an any-day vote, declaring every member should be put on record as there would be a terrible sequel for those favoring such a measure. Other legislators, he said, would reduce the age to 65 or 60 years, to increase the amount and make it compulsory upon counties to adopt the pension system. The senate at once acquiesced in the assembly amendments and just about the time the bill was ready to be passed, it was found that the bill will have been signed, published and become a law. County boards, at their first sessions, probably will proceed, by resolution, formally to rescind the innovation. The change has been made that it is projected for Milwaukee railroad.

The senate passed a bill introduced by Senator Horace J. Swenson of Iowa which will prevent the press and military ball being held in the state house. The measure prohibits any function, whether social or otherwise, in the capitol when a charter is demanded. Probably no where else on this continent have bills been given in so magnificent environment. It may be feared that the assembly will con-

By a vote of 71 to 25 the house concurred in the senate resolution asking the president to direct the state department not to enter financial arrangements between citizens of this country and foreign governments, which might lead to any form of military intervention. Senator Horace J. Swenson of Iowa, in the name of the assembly, told of the many millions used to corrupt the legation in the world war a charter should enough whatever the reason.

The senate advanced the socialist bill providing for comparative negligence in damage actions. Under the

contributory negligence law a suit for damages is defeated when the plaintiff is found slightly negligent. The recent act would allow the jury to assess damages by measuring the negligence of each of the parties.

A referendum by which voters of Wisconsin will at the general election in 1928 express their attitude on the question of amending the constitution to permit 27 1/2 per cent beer was approved by the senate, 19 to 13. The house is apt to concur.

A salary of \$10,000 is authorized for the governor in a proposed constitutional amendment, but it must not be assumed that his present compensation of \$5,000 represents all he receives by virtue of his office. The state supplies a handsome residence; fully heated, furnished and kept in repair. This is a generous perquisite. Yet I would not have it understood that the increased salary is not justified. 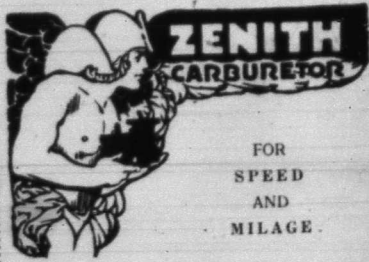

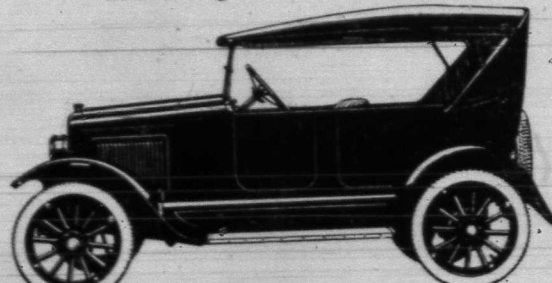

The assembly overrode the voiced objections of Governor Blaine and administration leaders when, 31 to 28, it passed the Edwards bill which repeals the 1913 licensing law, enacted in 1913. Not only did it pass the measure but directed it be sent to the senate at once, thereby forestalling reconsideration. Progressive supporting conservative effected the defeat of the administration.

The lower house adopted the legislative resolution which creates an advisory committee of legislators which in the months intervening between the close of this session and the opening of the next would investigate the question of taxation, draft a report and submit its findings to the 1927 legislature. The administration was against the measure.
