I. W. Commencement Events Begin on Friday, June 12

The outdoor Commencement exercises in the concrete stadium at Camp Randall which will be tried for the first time this spring at the University of Wisconsin, will take place at 5 o'clock Monday afternoon, June 22. The audience will sit in the horseshoe shape of the stadium and seats for the graduating class will be placed on the field facing the stadium. President E. A. Birge will deliver the principal address and confer the degrees. The first events of Commencement week-end will be the class play, given in the outdoor theatre on June 12 and 13. On Friday afternoon, June 12, the class day exercises and student picnic will take place on the shore of Lake Monona. In the evening the "Pup of Ponce" comedy will be held on the lower campus.
Saturday, June 20, will be Alumni day. Music at headquarters in the morning will be followed by a senior faculty-alumni luncheon at Lathrop cafeteria. A parade by classes on the upper campus, the Wisconsin-Chicago football game, and a concert by the university band on the president's lawn will be the events of Saturday afternoon. Saturday evening an alumni dinner, an informal reception at the president's home, and dancing in Lathrop hall are the program.
Sunday afternoon President Birge will speak at the Bursalaugave exercises in the Agricultural pavilion. At 4 o'clock the university band will play in Lincoln terrace.

Ford Production Steadily Increasing

The Ford Motor Company will have a new record for production Tuesday, May 12, when its assembly plants turned out 2,000 Ford cars and trucks in the eight-hour working day. This record is for the United States plants alone and does not include foreign plants and associated companies at the Ford Motor Company of China Ltd.
An interesting thing in connection with this remarkable production is that the company is exceeding its most careful estimates for May. Current Ford statistics, which were prepared daily last week, carry the message: "7,000 more above yesterday." But in actual output the company exceeded this by 500.
President of the company has been steadily increasing during the last few weeks due to the growing spring business and new output records have been frequent, but days approaching within 100 of the remarkable record of Tuesday.
On April 25 the domestic plants had a record of 2,000 cars and trucks. This record stood until May 12 when production went to 2,200.
