Once more that the pigs fed this new ration reached the market weight of 200 pounds 20 days before those fed on the ration of corn and tankage alone, thereby saving about a month's labor in feeding and caring for the pigs.

Still more important was the saving in tankage. The pigs given only corn and tankage required 4175 pounds of corn and 47.8 pounds of tankage for each 100 pounds gain, while those fed the efficient combination needed only 278 pounds of corn, 214 pounds of tankage, 10.6 pounds of chopped alfalfa hay and 10.6 pounds of linseed meal to make this same gain, a saving of 13.7 pounds of corn in putting on each 100 pounds of pork.

**OLD FASHIONED DANCE**  
Will the old fashioned dances ever come back?

This question, which is asked from every part of the country over where Harry Ford started to popularize the social dances of yesterday, finds its answer in the Exultant News in the review of an old fashioned dance held on an experiment in a factory dance hall frequented by the so-called young set.

"Officials of the dance hall had, during the dance for the express benefit of those of another generation who had been literally crowded from the dance

door by modern jazz music. But, they warmly anticipated 2000 men and women bowing for the right to dance," the waltz, schottische, polka and some dances. And, included in those who participated in this demonstration were all ages from sixteen to sixty.

"I never saw anything like it in my life, and I have been in the business for twenty-five years," said J. L. Wood, owner of the Anapolis. "I suppose if there would be more than a handful try to dance these old-fashioned dances. But look at it."

It was a sight worth seeing. The couples were jammed on the floor trying to take the three skipping steps in the eye-walk, and under the glare of the flood lights in for the motion picture, the moving mass resembled nothing so much as a great school of swimmers in a narrow space being driven forward and back by water waves. White hair, bald heads, gray curls were thickly sprinkled amid the

bobbed heads of flapper and glittering smoothness of the sleek hair cut. If the Tuesday night dance is any criterion the entire city of Ironton will be dancing the old-time waltz, quadrille, schottische and waltzes inside of a week — every Tuesday night in the near future. Business men and their wives as well as those in less important industrial jobs were present, and professional men rubbed elbows with factory workers. It was a study in types and contrasts.

**LEAD AND MONEY SAVED BY NEW PIG RATION**  
"Pigs suffer much more frequently from unbalanced, inefficient rations than do any other class of livestock," says F. H. Morrison, nationally known "Swiss-made" Chief of Agriculture.

He advocates for this in the fact that hogs are fed largely on grain, which is poor both in protein and mineral

matter, and that they eat relatively little roughage, except when on pasture. He says that the so-called "Standard ration" for growing pigs, composed of corn and tankage in equal parts, for developing thereby full intense skin, milk or other dairy by-products is simply a combination of corn, tankage, chopped alfalfa hay, and just but not best-linseed meal. This combination has been tested on hundreds of pigs, and we are certain of the results," he declares.

The experiments brought out the pigs fed on the corn and tankage ration gained slightly less than a pound a day, while those fed the efficient combination, given above, gained 1.15 pounds, on the average. This differ-
