Lorenz Wolf

Lorenz Wolf was born in Graubünden, Switzerland, Switzerland, September 26, 1847. He passed away after a lingering illness, at his home in Mazomanie, Monday morning, January 4, 1926, aged seventy-eight years, three months and fourteen days.

When he was seventeen years of age he came to this country with his older brother. They traveled about the state for several years, working at various occupations, making use of the opportunities of the new land, until he chose the cooper trade, he being an apprentice at Sauk City.

He married Esther Steier at Sauk City, August 18, 1872. They had three children in total for two years, then emigrated to Mazomanie where he opened his own cooper shop. He operated this shop for many years until he advent of modern machinery and large scale production.

His wife preceded him in death two years ago. He is survived by his brother John, of San Antonio, Calif.; six children, and thirteen grand children. PURE-BRED dairy cattle are now selling at bargain prices, according to the Blue Valley Creamery Institute, which has just completed a survey of the dairy industry. This is certainly the time to improve herds. At no time in the past ten years has there been such a favorable opportunity for the man or woman who milks cows to acquire good blood. In 1922 pure-bred dairy bulls of all breeds averaged \$222.00. Today this same pure-bred bull is being purchased for an average of \$134.00.
