## WISCONSIN FISHY THREE ARE VALUABLE ASSET

By R. O. Winkler, Superintendent of Wisconsin Fisheries.

Here is the seventh of a series of articles about Wisconsin fisheries, game, and birds, and people. Wisconsin rivers and inland lakes need to be reclaimed from time to time to uphold their reputation as a fisherman's paradise.

During 1925 the state conservation commission had had planted, including fish received from the over-seas, land along the Wisconsin and Wolf rivers, nearly 100,000 fish.

Was back in the year 1874 our three first fish commissioners, William Walsh, A. Palmer and E. R. Hay, agreed that "we may assume as a safe proposition that no state in the Union, excepted from the seaboard, is better suited for fish culture than Wisconsin."

While these early conservationists made many statements in their fish report that have proved wrong as time has gone by, one recommendation, for instance, the propagation of carp for our inland waters, turned out a great and wonderful truth that, being appreciated more and more as time goes on, when they are stated that Wisconsin was especially suited for fish culture.

From the humble beginning in 1875 when the Madison hatchery was established, there has been a steady growth, and great interest manifested in this important branch of the state service.

In operation, Madison hatchery, in addition, one fine Pullman coach fish car, known as Baker No. 2, is maintained for the purpose of distributing fish from the various hatcheries. The demand for fish this year was so great that it became necessary to borrow from the Chicago and Northwestern Railway Company a second car, known as Smith and equip it with an amazing system in order to distribute the fish that were applied for.

In the ten thousand miles of trout streams in the state are found the three principal kinds of trout that are best adapted to this part of the country, namely, brook, brown and rainbow. In the eight hundred square miles of inland lake water, that the state possesses, there are all of the very best kinds of fish that are to be found anywhere in inland water, such as pike, perch, muskellunge, large and small-mouth black bass and all the other pan fish that are members of the sun fish family.

The artificial propagation of fish has been carried on for many centuries but there are new problems to solve each year for each hatchery. The work of hatching fish is divided into two periods of seasons—one confined to the fish that spawn on the falling temperature while the others may be classed as spawning on the rising temperature.

During the fall and winter eggs are collected from all kinds of trout and whitefish while all fishes found in inland lakes spawn in the spring and are classed with the species spawning on a rising temperature. The first fish to spawn in the fall are the brook and lake trout while the fish, first to spawn in the spring, are the pickerel, quickly followed by the walleye, john and "musk" and the bass and other members of the sun fish family.

Inland lake fish eggs hatch in much shorter time than is required for trout on account of the gradual rise in temperature during their incubation. Wall-eyed pike will hatch in 30 to 40 days in water of 56 to 58 degrees in white flannels, but I have known of eggs that hatched in forty-eight hours when the mean temperature was about 70 or 75 degrees. Such conditions are unusual and good results are obtained.

The various hatcheries of the state are located in or near towns after which they are named. For trout hatcheries are located at Bayfield, Madison, St. Croix Falls, Wild River, Oneida, Harpwood, Tolerwood and Westwood. The experimental hatchery, where Great Lakes fishes are hatched, are Bayfield, Superior Bay and the Wisconsin State hatchery at Madison.

## A MANMOTH HOTEL ON WHEELS

Only one great railroad in the United States owns and operates its own sleeping cars.

The Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway is that road. Its sleepers throughout provide for almost five thousand persons at one time—counting one passenger to a bed.

Like a hotel also, the railroad must furnish meals to its guests, and, to do so, maintains a dining room 11,000 feet long. Its fleet of dining cars runs at one time 1,250 persons, and average 2,000 meals a day.

This is also equal to the patronage of the dining rooms of the large hotels.

To properly care for the lines used in this railroad's sleeping and dining cars a large laundry is maintained by it at Chicago in which some 1,500,000 pieces are laundered yearly.

In the course of a twelve-month period the Milwaukee Road's dining cars use carloads of vegetables and fruits and great quantities of milk, butter, and other products.

More than 70,000 meals were needed last year to supply the demand.
