## OBITUARY

### N. F. Showers

Spencer Franklin Showers was born at Cross Plains, Dane county, Wisconsin, October 8, 1846. He died March 24th, 1926, at the age of seventy-nine years. His ability and versatility gave him the reputation of being the best fiddler in the village. He was the third of thirteen children. Little time was spent in securing an education as his help was needed in making a living for the large family. He was married May 2nd, 1869, to Sophia Spierhaken, who has preceded him in death by six years. Their fifty-two years of companionship in married life was of untold happiness. This union was blessed with two sons and one daughter, Fred, of Madison, California, Milton, of Mazomanie, and Grace, of Delavan, Wisconsin, all of whom were privileged to be with their father during the last days of his sickness. We laid him to rest in a sweet orchard soil where the sun's last ray has for six years past shone on the resting place of one whose smiling face, at the time of her departure from the scene of time to pass before he would join her. There was a life full of days of labor well spent serving their God and their fellow men to the fullest of their ability. Innumerable and unnumbered were the deeds they performed for their fellowmen, during great plagues from the thought of that motto "Be ye as ye would be served." A man never known to seek or hold a public office yet holding in his highest esteem the inestimable worth of those who carried on burdensome duties of public life. Withdrawn from three public activities, yet often considered, negligent of his duties as a citizen, but he was ever mindful of that great teaching:

## Putting Farm Work Horses in Condition

Progress in farm field work in the coming months depends largely on the condition of the work horses, kept from the winter's rest, farm work becomes a conditioning job as well as a regular training for his line.

Every farmer knows that two or three weeks spent in a gradual conditioning and conditioning of a horse for the heavy work is more than made up before the season of heavy field work is over. But only slow conditioning methods breaking them in to the four hours of hard pull that they must perform, but giving no real training to them in a working nation.

It is poor practice to allow a horse to pasture on much new lush grass if he is to go on a strenuous work schedule. A little grain is good for him, helps to condition him, but he must have oats, bran or old corn, or still better, a combination of the three and good mixed hay. These are the best possible ration in the spring and early summer. The horse that is fed a smaller ration of grain each gets soft, sweats profusely, lags and quickly tires out. Oats, bran, corn and hay will give him stamina and leave him in the best condition at the end of the day.

For breaking old horses fairly, putting him ready for spring work with daily exercise, keeping him thoroughly groomed, especially while shedding, and a work ration instead of his winter feed will pay big dividends in a short time.

If the horse takes a long time to shed his coat, this can be hastened by thorough, frequent grooming, and if this does not do the work, a clipping all over will get him through the shedding period quickly. After the horse has started to work in the field, it is advisable to bathe the shoulders and neck two or three times daily with cold, wet, milky water or with white soap suds, which loosens and cleanses the chafed parts.

A pronounced veterinarian states that excessive sweating is avoided by "clipping" the horse. Excessive sweating weakens the animal and it is advisable quite advisable to clip him to relieve this condition. It is also true that this practice enables the horse to be thoroughly groomed in much less time than when it retains its long winter coat of shaggy hair.

## WISCONSIN INVENTOR GAVE THE BUSINESS WORLD THE TYPEWRITER

This is the eighth of a series of articles about Wisconsin inventors, resources, institutions and people.

Wisconsin has contributed many of the nation's most important inventions.

A Wisconsin invention that has made over our commercial life is the typewriter. In fact, so important is the typewriter to modern business life that it is difficult to realize that it is little more than half a century since Christopher Latham Sholes, of Milwaukee, sold his interest in the invention to the Remington Arms Company, of Ilion, New York, for \$10,000.

This is the machine which has revolutionized office practice, freed the business and professional world from the slavery of the pen and opened the door of the business world to women.

After the invention of the printing press and the perfection of a system of shorthand, many attempts were made to produce a workable substitute for the pen. The first American patent was granted in 1829 to W. A. Burt, of Detroit. None of his machines, however, were very successful. Numerous other countries some of one kind and another were invented and patented in America and England.

All of these machines printed clearly and were reported to work well but they were clumsy, awkward, and much slower than the pen work which they were intended to supersede. None of them could ever have saved time by increasing speed and legibility. This is what was demanded of a successful writing machine. To Sholes belongs the credit for making a practicable machine and for the name "typewriter."

Sholes was a liberal descendant of John and Priscilla Alden. Receiving the usual elementary education, he that day he went to work at the saw of "Quincy," an enterprising in the printing trade. After four years he completed his apprenticeship and moved to Green Bay where his brother was living.

In 1868 when he was but sixteen years old he went to Madison and took care of the Journal of the Territorial Legislature which he carried to Philadelphia to have printed. The next year he became editor of the Wisconsin Inquirer, Madison, which his brother had purchased. All of his life he was spent under the shadow of the terrible, crippling, paralysis, and he finally succumbed to it.

"Whatever I may have felt in the early days of the value of the typewriter, it is obviously a blessing to mankind and equally to comfort and kind. I am glad I had something to do with it. I built better than I knew and the world has the benefit of it."

The first machine which Sholes invented was a simple one letter affair made with an old telegraph key, a sheet of glass and odds and ends of wood and metal. It printed only a series of W's, but it was the germ of the final machine. Sholes had already invented a numbering machine and he was constantly experimenting with printing devices. He was the first man to print the names and addresses of subscribers on the margin of the newspaper for mailing.

Sholes showed his machine to Carlos S. Gifford and Samuel W. Soule. They continued to perfect it with him, and in the autumn of 1874, built the first machine for Charles Walker, a court reporter. It had a movable carriage, conveying type bars, and a keyboard like that of a piano.

The first improvement was to re-arrange the keyboard after the fashion of the pianist who put the most commonly used letters in the position most convenient to use. The new keyboard had four banks of letters with dials to influence the letters. After much study the letters were arranged on the keyboard such as we have them today.

At the time Sholes was making his

**SESQUICENTENNIAL HISTORY SKETCHES**

The one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence will be observed by the Sesquicentennial International Exposition, which opens at Philadelphia, June 1, 1926.

### Richard Stockton, Signer

Thrown into the common prison in New York was a band of loyalists, and treated with the utmost severity during the Revolution, was the fate of Richard Stockton, of New Jersey, signer of the Declaration of Independence, to be commemorated by the Sesqui-Centennial International Exposition, in Philadelphia, June 1, 1926.

At the direction of Congress, General Washington reconvened with General Howe, and Stockton was exchanged shortly afterward, but his health had been permanently impaired.

The New Jersey signer was born near Princeton, in 1730. He was graduated from Princeton College, after which he studied law. When United Great Britain a few years later, he exerted himself especially to secure the prevailing insurance regarding the American colonies. For a while he strove to effect a reconciliation between the colonies and the mother country and was silent for a time in the opening debates.
