FORD UPHOLSTERY

Introducing the life of upholsterers before it is used to trim the car is a problem which the Ford Motor Company has solved by the development of a number of unique and conclusive tests. Before Ford upholstery cloth is released for production, samples are tested by chemicals, pulled apart and even worn out in an especially constructed rubbing machine.

Some of the cloth used in Ford cars is manufactured right in the Ford plant where it may be held to specific and exacting specifications. Most of the upholstery, however, is supplied by outside sources and must prove its fitness before being used.

Color and structure of the cloth are first scrutinized. Then, samples are sent to the laboratory for chemical and physical tests. In the test for tensile strength, samples from the remaining directions of the cloth are tested. The direction of the warp or the cross of the cloth are tested to pieces by means of a standard testing machine. In this connection, it is interesting to note that although the Ford specifications are unusually rigid, upholstery now being used shows practically twice the required strength.

Wool content is determined by use of chemicals. The fiber is taken from the animal which distinguishes all the wool. The remaining cotton must not only show the correct percentage, but must show a perfect pattern and distribution of cotton fibers as well.

Another test is similar to that which the material will receive in actual usage. A cushion is trimmed with sample upholstery and placed in a machine together with a cushion trimmed with the Felt "Machinery of Ease" quality. At the rate of 120 times per minute, the two cushions back and forth until one or the other is worn out. If the sample wears out first, it is immediately discarded. But if it stands up as long as the cushion trimmed with the known material it has proved itself to equal Ford standards of quality.



WHAT IS EVAPORATED MILK?

Did you ever try to figure out the exact meaning of "Evaporated Milk"? The word "evaporated" may give you the idea that in the process of evaporation the milk has lost some of its valuable qualities. It hasn't. In fact, it hasn't gained any. Sixty per cent of the water is evaporated from the milk after it comes fresh from the cow.

The first step in processing the milk is separating the cream from a portion of the total content in a pasteurizer.

The second step is the homogenization, which assures the cream being distributed evenly throughout the milk. The third is the canning. The fourth is the evaporating. This is the part that can be done when the milk is subjected to sufficient heat to destroy the bacteria. Thus evaporated milk remains as pure and fresh in the container as when it is removed into the pail in the farmer's barn.

Evaporated milk is now generally recognized as the freshest milk available to those "on-the-go" farmers and producers of the world. For fresh milk is milk on-the-go.

Transportation of milk from the dairy country to the city is still systematic and rapid and ready to serve the immense quantities of milk that must be handled in the cities. It can be obtained at considerable distances and a large per cent is never more than some days old when it is delivered by the milkman.

Evaporated milk, on the other hand, is not subject to transportation.

When the dairy barn, dairy and regular inspection, is hurried by farmers in factories located in the heart of the dairy country, and delivered when it is wanted, it is the freshest milk available at its "freshest moment," when it is in its final state. It is never allowed to get old. The whole process from cow to can requires only a few hours.

The result is that the progress of sterilization takes place after the milk has been sealed in its containers. Once in its sterilized containers, there is no possibility of deterioration.

The sterilizing of evaporated milk insures its purity; it makes a safe milk for the children. Evaporated milk is boiled milk, and this makes it more digestible.

It must be noted for any milk used in soups and soufflés.

An ordinary cream needs one pint of water to come from the can. An evaporated milk is dried, with an equal part of water. For cooking and heating two parts water and one part milk will suffice.
