OBITUARY

Mrs. Daniel Clark

Harriet Abner Campbell was born a November 22, 1849, at Bellevue, Ohio, and died May 7, 1926, aged seventy-six years, five months and eleven days.

She came to Mazomanie, Wis., in 1896, with the family of Barney Campbell, her father. After obtaining an education in a few early-day women schools in the vicinity, she taught school in Mazomanie, Black Earth and Prairie du Chien.

She was married on December 23, 1874, at Hampton, Iowa, the bridegroom being her father and mother, to Daniel Wright Clark. The first twenty-eight years of their married life was spent in Dodgeville, Wis., afterward living about persons at Barnard, Prairie du Chien, Mazomanie and Ladysmith, Wis.

She died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Wayne L. Bullen, of Ladysmith, Wis., with whom she had lived for the past two years.

Of her family there are surviving, her husband, Daniel W. Clark, one daughter, Mrs. Wayne Bullen, of Ladysmith, Wis., two sons, Mr. Harry W. Clark, of Milwaukee, and Seymour B. Clark, of Fond du Lac, Wis., and five grandsons.

The body was brought to Mazomanie Tuesday evening, and taken to the Masonic undertaking room. Funeral services were held at the Methodist church Wednesday afternoon, conducted by Rev. F. M. Probst. Interment was at the Mazomanie cemetery.

Among those present at the funeral were Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Bullen, of Ladysmith; Seymour Clark, of Fond du Lac; Mrs. May Morris of Milwaukee; Mrs. May Taylor, of Madison.


MILLIONS OF BACTERIA SUPPORT MANY STATE INDUSTRIES

By E. C. HODGINS, Bacteriologist of Wisconsin College of Agriculture

Bacteria have an important relation in the industries of the state of Wisconsin. The study of bacteria has many applications in the dairy, soil, and silo and in the general industries of manufacture, fermentation, pickling and all phases of various processes and in sewage disposal.

The University of Wisconsin is playing a part in the development of these various lines of work. It prepares bacteriologists for distribution by the State Department of Agriculture for use by its own veterinarians and by the practicing veterinarians of the state. During the past year it prepared, at a cost of approximately \$5,000, tuberculin which, if bought on the open market at wholesale prices, would have cost the farmers of the state in excess of \$25,000. The farmers are being supplied, at cost, with cultures for the inoculation of the most important diseases such as tuberculosis and anthrax. The College of Agriculture has carried on an intensive campaign to introduce these bacteria into the agriculture of the state.

Acid-forming bacteria are being regularly applied to "approximately one-third of the 280 Swiss cheese factories of the state, and cultures of the Propionis acid organism, which is responsible for the development of the eyes of Swiss cheese and for the characteristic flavor, are supplied to a limited number of factories. Bacteria are also employed in the manufacture of butter and American cheese.

Robert Treat Paine, Signer

Robert Treat Paine, Massachusetts signer of the Declaration of Independence, the one hundred and fifty-fifth anniversary of the Sesquicentennial International Exposition, which opens at Philadelphia, June 1, 1926.

He was born in Boston in 1726, the son of a merchant, and was educated at Harvard College and at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He was a member of the Continental Congress, and while a member of the Assembly was elected a delegate to the General Congress. He was defeated by this Congress, with two others, to visit the Army of General Schuyler in the North for the purpose of observation, which commission was performed with entire satisfaction.

In December, 1776, he was elected a member to the General Congress, in which he was very active. On the fourth of July of the following year he voted for the Declaration of Independence and was one of its signers.

After his retirement from the General Congress, he held many important offices in Massachusetts, the last one being Judge of the Supreme Court. He died in 1814 at the age of 84 years.

The Wisconsin vegetable growers paid to Wisconsin farmers for raw products in the year 1924 over \$11,000,000 and to Wisconsin consumers over \$2,000,000. Over 50 per cent of the value of Wisconsin canned foods comes from outside of the state. In other words, Wisconsin consumes less than 5 per cent of the canned food that she produces.

A considerable amount of hemp is grown in this state. The retting of the product is done in the open air, a "bacterial" problem, in which the College of Agriculture is interested.

The production of wheat for bread and of soya beans and other foodstuffs in Milwaukee involving bacteria.

The bacteriology of Milwaukee and of Fond du Lac are among the largest of the world. Some are making extensive investigations for research in the bacteriology and chemistry of drinking.

Milwaukee will soon have in active operation an extensive sewage disposal plant, which will care for the entire sewage of the city. Madison is constructing a \$1,000,000 plant to protect its water supplies from deep wells. The lakes surrounding the city represent an important asset, and the sewage of the city will be so treated as to protect the lakes.
