When leaving the school house after the annual banquet and program Saturday night, several ladies found that someone had entered the cloak room and stolen their handbags. Miss Helen Davidson lost \$10.00, Miss Grace Morrow, a small sum, and a valuable case was lost by Miss Victor Hesterman. The handbags of pocket books when the cloak room was given as a surprise to the community school. Marshal Howard was notified of the thefts, and accompanied a young man who had driven late to an old Ford that evening. Madison, Sunday afternoon, where he is held at the county jail on deferred sentence. Walton admitted having served ten months in an industrial school for being involved in the theft of fifteen automobiles at Milwaukee a year ago. During the questioning, he stated that he had found a pair of shoes in one of the handbags, and had seen \$1.50 in a case of craps with the local men.

A disastrous fire wrecked the home of King garage, destroyed his household effects, and also R. G. Fickling's stock of hardware goods, located in what is commonly called the little block on Crockett street, at 125 early last Tuesday morning. The alarm was given at about three o'clock and although the firemen responded promptly, the fire had gained considerable headway before their arrival on the scene. All the cars in the garage and some oil drums were gutted, also a dozen or more new sewing machines which were stored there by garage agents, but the tools, stock and other equipment in the garage and office were destroyed. The living rooms adjoin the garage, and Mr. and Mrs. King, occupying rooms on the second floor over the office, had scant time to get out of the building. Their daughter, Miss Helen, was at Goshen and the dog was outside. All the household goods, including piano and clothing, were destroyed. Mr. King carried \$2,000 insurance on his home, but this is not sufficient to cover his loss, especially if his business are badly damaged. A number of citizens also lost shoes left there for repairs. The building, owned by Israel Jensen, of Prairie du Sac, was very badly damaged. The walls are intact, but the roof and interior are a mass of ruins. Many of the windows are broken. The building was insured for \$1,000. The fire is supposed to have started in the room back of the office in the garage. It was a southern blaze, covering a large area, and the flames fought valiantly from three until nearly six o'clock before the flames were finally subdued.
