Pioneer Passes

Elmer Beck, of Puyallup, Wash., sends us the following clipping, stating that the Campbell's were residents of this place in the early 90's, and that their place adjoins his.

James Campbell, a resident of Mt. View for the past 15 years, died on June 10th, 1926, at the Puyallup Valley Hospital.

Funeral services were held Saturday, June 12th, Rev. J. E. Overton officiating. He was buried in Summit cemetery beside his wife who died March 7, 1926.

Mr. Campbell was born July 24, 1848 on Prince Edward Island, E. of C., and came to the United States, settling in the Civil War from Wisconsin. He was a member of the order of Railway Conductors and was employed on the C. M. and St. P. railroad almost 30 years. He leaves a daughter and son, Mrs. E. E. Schindler and Bert Campbell of Mt. View; two brothers, Judge Fremont Campbell, of Tacoma, Wash. George M. Campbell, of Austin, Minn., and one sister, of Vineland, N. J.

OBITUARY

Sarah B. Raynor.

Miss Sarah Berwell Raynor passed away at the home of her sister, Mrs. Alice Lloyd, at Arcus, July 8, 1926, at the age of eighty-six years, nine months and twenty-three days.

She was born May 14, 1840, at England, September 12, 1850. At the age of seven years came to the country with her parents and settled in Mounds Creek. She joined the Methodist church in early childhood and has since been a follower of that faith. Her father was a local preacher in the Methodist church for over forty years.

She was one of a family of six children, all having preceded her in death excepting one brother, John B. Raynor, of Arcus, with whom she has made her home for the past eleven years. Besides her brother she leaves several nieces and nephews.

The funeral was held on Saturday with services at the home of John B. Raynor at two o'clock p. m. Rev. F. M. French officiating. Interment was made in the Maunabo cemetery.

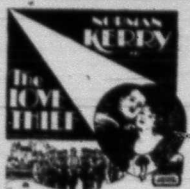

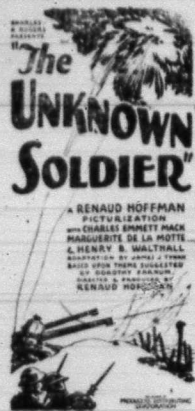

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Galli-Curci Swayed by the Seer of Sweden

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Insulating Poultry Houses

In a climate where the temperature is liable to go as low as 30 or 40 degrees below zero, there is a decided advantage, of course, in making a poultry house just about as warm as possible to make it and the question of insulation is a vital one.

One man living near Duluth who has adopted the Minnesota Model poultry house and conducts an extensive establishment has made his roof as follows: rafters 2x6 feet, lined with matched boards, the space between the rafters filled with dry sawdust, matched boards on top of the rafters covered with three-ply roofing paper.

Some are also building the side walls in much the same way, filling the space between the 2x4 studs with sawdust, shavings, or flax straw packed tightly. The objection here, of course, particularly to the sawdust and shavings, is that they settle, leaving an open-air space at the top of the wall, and that there is more or less condensation within the wall itself, which in time concentrates at the bottom and has a tendency to cause decay at that point.

The most common method, perhaps, of building a wall is to board in with matched boards outside of the studs, use outside of that single-ply tarred paper or roofing paper, some standard insulation, and then dropping, clapboards, or shingles outside of all. Where a very warm house is desired, and I might say that such is advisable if winter feed prices are to be a factor, well, the inside of the studs with matched boards running up and down. This is advisable because it facilitates spraying and because considerable moisture accumulates in the walls, particularly in the winter.

At University Farm, St. Paul, one of the very old and lightly constructed houses was very materially improved by putting with a patent lath covering the same with a thin coat of plaster. This was very satisfactory indeed, but of course other plaster bases may be substituted.
