Negro to be Tried Saturday.
The preliminary hearing in the trial of Marshall O'Bannon, Madison negro who is alleged to have shot and killed

Deerfield Mother Dies From Burns.

Source of Road Fund.

A wrong impression rather generally prevails, the highway commission funds as to where the \$27,000,000 available for highway construction work in Wisconsin for the year 1921 came from and what this large sum is.

In the first place, \$1,000,000 of the amount is the unexpended balance from 1920. Then to take the sums in their order as they appear in the highway commission's report:

For federal aid roads there is the sum of \$7,103,625 available. One-third of this comes from the federal government, and in order that the state may secure it, the state itself must raise one-third of the \$7,103,625 and the counties the remaining third. Of the \$2,647,510 available for state aid roads, the state contributes \$785,000, and the counties the balance. The \$670,000 available for county aid roads, the \$1,062,000 available for county aid highways, bond issues for state trunk highway, aggregating \$3,112,000, the \$310,000 available for state trunk highway maintenance, the \$2,085,000 available for maintenance of county trunk systems, quarries and pits products \$129,229, machinery \$800,454, for emergency use \$298,918, are all raised by the counties. The \$2,200,000 available for maintenance from the state comes from automobile license. This accounts for the whole \$27,000,000 available for 1921 for roads and bridges in Wisconsin.

Guard Mail Train Through Madison.
Additional precautions and defense

MAIL IS A COMMODITY OF GREAT VALUE. Mail carriers and operators are heavily armed and have been instructed to carefully guard against allowing any one not known and trusted employees in the cars.

Fearing an attempt such as was successfully made in Toledo and Minneapolis, officials have given instructions for employees on the flyer of the North-western route, which reaches Madison at 1:00 p. m., enroute for Minneapolis from Chicago. This is the fastest train in the west, for there are but five schedule stops.

Thursday is the Wisconsin workman's best day. This is shown in the industrial commission's records.

On Monday, called by time-honored dictum, "blue," he is disinclined to honor his bad affairs. Consequently

Government Savings Securities.

Despite chaotic financial and industrial conditions in 1920, more than \$8,000,000 worth (maturity value) of Government Savings Certificates were sold to thirty investors in the seventh reserve district—Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, and Wisconsin—during the year, according to preliminary reports received from the postoffice and Federal Reserve Bank. The sales by states in a cash value basis, were as follows:

Illinois	\$3,005,488.45
Indiana	2,905,541.02
Iowa	625,452.45
Michigan	1,222,541.02
Wisconsin	874,003.33

Figures so far compiled throughout continental United States for sales were \$41,000,700, which amounts to approximately forty cents saved by every man, woman and child in the country. Reports from territories and possessions have not been received, but it is expected they will swell the figures considerably.

In the seventh district, Indiana leads with a per capita of 72¢. Illinois is second with 46¢. Wisconsin third with 25¢. Michigan has 16 and Iowa 15¢. The government is continuing the sale of Savings securities this year with the addition of a 41-cent interest-bearing stamp, and a \$25 Treasury Savings Certificate which takes its place with the \$100 and \$1,000 Treasury Savings Certificates, paying four per cent interest, compounded quarterly.

Store Looted at Basco.

Burglars broke into the postoffice and store of E. J. Henry, of Basco, Friday night, according to a report made to County Sheriff William McCormick, on Saturday. The men escaped with five automobile tires, some small change, pocket shirts, hams, and children's shoes. Nothing was touched in the postoffice department. The proprietor has offered a reward of \$50 for the arrest and conviction of the men.

INCOME TAX RETURNS DUE

Business Men, Farmers and Wage Workers Must File Schedules of Income for 1919.

MARCH 15 LAST FILING DATE.

Net incomes of \$1,000 or over, if Single; or \$2,000 or over if Married, Must Be Reported.

The Income Tax imposed by Act of Congress on earnings of the year 1919 is now being collected. Returns under oath must be made on or before March 15 by every citizen and resident who had a net income for 1919 amounting to:

\$1,000 or over, if single; or if married and living apart from wife (or husband); or if widowed or divorced, \$2,000 or over, if married and living with wife (or husband).

The status of the person on the last day of the year fixes the status for the year with respect to the above requirements.

Under any of these circumstances a return must be made, even though no tax is due.

Husband and wife must consider the income of both, plus that of dependent minor children, in meeting this requirement; and, if sufficient to require a return, all items must be shown in a joint return or in separate returns of husband and wife.

A single person with minor dependents must include the income of such dependents.

Minor who has a net income of \$1,000 or more is not considered a dependent, and must file a separate return.

Personal returns should be made on Form 1040A, unless the net income exceeded \$5,000, in which case Form 1040 should be used.

Residents of Wisconsin should file their returns with, and make payments of Income Tax to, Bert Williams, Collector of Internal Revenue, Milwaukee.

How to Figure Income.

The way to find out whether one must file a return is to get a Form 1040A and follow the instructions printed on it. That form will serve as a single return for every item of income, and if a return is due it tells how to prepare and file it.

If in doubt on any point as to income or deductions, consult a tax expert.

Guesswork, estimates and other hit-or-miss methods are barred when a person is making out his Income Tax return. Accurate and complete returns must be filed on time. The return is a sworn statement. As such it must be accurate and complete.

Salaries and wages earners must ascertain the actual compensation received. Overtime, bonuses, shares in the profits of a business, value of quarters and board furnished by the employer over personal living expenses, compensation for services—must be included.

It must be borne in mind that compensation may be paid in other forms than in cash. A bonus paid in Liberty Bonds is taxable at the market value of the bonds. A note received in compensation for services is taxable income at its face value, and the interest upon it is also taxable.

Other Returns Due.

Every partnership doing business in the United States must file a return on Form 1065, and every person in service corporation must file a similar return.

Corporations must file annual returns on Form 1120.

Trustees, executors, administrators and others acting in a fiduciary capacity are required to file returns. In some cases, Form 1041 is used; in others, Form 1040; and still others, returns on both forms are required. Information returns, on Forms 1089 and 1090, must be filed by every organization, firm or person who paid during 1919 a sum of \$1,000 in interest, dividends, rent, or other fixed or determinable income to another person, partnership, personal service corporation or fiduciary. These information returns should be forwarded directly to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue (sorting division), Washington, D. C.

INCOME TAX IN NUTSHELL.

WHO—Single persons who had net income of \$1,000 or more for year 1919.

Married couples who had net income of \$2,000 or more.

WHEN—March 15, 1920, is final date for filing returns and making first payments.

HOW—Full directions on Form 1040A and Form 1040 also the law and regulations.

WHAT—Four per cent normal tax on taxable income up to \$1,000 in excess of exemption. Eight per cent normal tax on balance of taxable income. Surplus, from one per cent to sixty-five per cent on net income over \$8,000.
