Commencement Week Of The Mazomanie High School

High School Commencement for 1921, a momentous time in the lives of some of our young people, is now a matter of history.

The exercises throughout the week showed careful training, and hard work upon the part of both teachers and pupils, and the district has every reason to be well pleased with the successful closing of the year's work.

The week's program was opened the evening of May 29, with the baccalaureate sermon, a masterly address by Reverend George Shepard, of the Community Church.

Two evenings of the week, Tuesday and Wednesday, were given over to the class play, "All on account of Polly." The management of the Ma-jestic very kindly turned over their theater for these evenings. The play was very pleasing in itself, and was remarkably well carried out by members of the class. There seemed to be no general favorite, the leading characters being so well suggested that there were no single bright and shining stars. In fact it might be said that it was "an all star cast," each member entering so thoroughly into the spirit of his part that for the time his efforts were not acting. Hearty appreciation of the strenuous efforts put forth by all was shown by crowded houses at both performances.

About the Proposed Sale of Our Transmission Line.

To the electors of the village of Mazomanie:
The Railroad Commission having

given their approval, a special election is called for Monday, June 20. At that time the electors are asked to vote on the question of selling the transmission line.

As a result of the hearing held June 2, the Commission says, in part: "After full investigation and consideration of all the evidence before it, the Commission found and determined that said sale is advisable and will serve the best interests of said municipality and of the residents thereof." Your village board of trustees are unanimously in favor of accepting the Wisconsin River Power Company's offer for our line, for the following reasons: First, within the last two years we have had expenses on the transmission line alone amounting to over \$3,000. The six years we have had the line are the years we should expect the least expense as the line was new. It is probable that from now on the line will require more repairs each succeeding year. Second, we have now nearly reached the capacity of our line and unless we sell we shall, in the near future, have to do just what the Power Company proposes to do, that is, rebuild our line, putting on larger cross arms, heavier wire and larger insulators. Besides the expense incurred, we should have the inconvenience of being without current a good many days, possibly weeks, while the

Power Company would be able with a force of thirty or forty men to make the change during the daylight hours of four Sundays. Third, the Wisconsin River Power Company has voluntarily agreed to sell us our current cheaper, inasmuch as it will be measured at our switchboard, instead of at the dam, thus eliminating the loss in transmission. This would mean a yearly saving of more than \$300, for last year we paid for over 22,000 kilowatts that we did not get.

Without figuring anything for possible liability, damage by storm, or insurance on our investment, we would save the following sum: Depreciation, \$550; maintenance and patrolling, \$200; cost of current, \$300. This makes a total yearly saving of \$1,050. We are now receiving \$800 yearly rent for the use of our line. From these figures you will readily see that we should be far better off if we gave the Power Company the line, but they have offered to pay us \$7,000 for the line and \$7,000 for the new transformers we have just bought, making a total of \$14,000. We shall still own our distribution plant, local lines, etc. The difference will be that the current will be delivered to our switchboard instead of measured to us at the Prairie du Sac dam.

It has been thought by some that if the Company owned the transmission line they might ask for an increase in rates. They have stated that they do not intend to ask for an increase. In fact, they are making us a better rate. If they saw fit, they could ask for an increase under the present conditions just the same as they could if they owned the line.

You are urged not to vote against the proposition to sell the line until you have first gotten facts from some member of the board of trustees. We probably shall never have another opportunity to sell. The Wisconsin River Power Company would not give us a penny for our line, were it not that they can use it in completing a 33,000 volt line to the Mineral Point plant, which they own. They wish to avoid, if possible, paralleling another line. If this 33,000 volt line goes through here we shall have sufficient power for all purposes and all times, which may eventually work to our further advantage through the location of industries seeking cheap and efficient electric power, and for which inquiries are frequently received at the big Power Plant.

River Power Co., current, \$236.91; J. F. Segelbrecht, frt. and dray, 17.75; Grusel, Quarfot Co. supplies, 83.39; Edw. Neuvahl, labor on w. v., 9.50; Wm. Schmitz, labor on streets, 23.10; Ernest Titley, labor on streets, 9.65; E. G. Campbell, labor on streets, 9.65; Ray Schlough, labor on streets, 6.12; Geo. Villlette, labor on streets, 72.85; Mrs. Bridges Co., dray, 33.29; R. D. Denn, sidewalk relate, 18.06; R. D. Denn, salary, 115.00; John Braun, salary, 20.00; B. & H. Lbr. Co., lumber and coal, 50.16; Gen. Elec. Co., trans. and cable, 730.72.

A motion was made, seconded, and carried, that the coal room at the power house be rented to the Equity for \$3.00 per month.

The board voted to pay the election inspectors and election clerks \$4.00, and the ballot clerks \$3.00, for their services at the special election June 20. A motion was made, seconded, and carried, that the meeting be adjourned until Monday evening, June 6th.

An adjourned meeting of the Village Board was held on Monday evening, June 6, 1921. All members were present except Trustee Trager.

A motion was made, seconded, and carried, that Mrs. C. H. Butts be allowed to build a shed in the street adjoining her property.

A motion was made, seconded, and carried, that the marshal be required to keep the drinking fountain clean.

A motion was made, seconded, and carried, that the village order water mains and fittings necessary to extend the water mains from the corner of Broad and High streets, west to Crocker street and north on Crocker street to Division street.

A motion was made, seconded, and carried, that the matter of putting in the water mains be left to the Light and Water committee.

A motion was made, seconded, and carried, that the district school board be asked, if the northeast part of the school yard may be used as a camping ground for tourists during the months of June, July and August, if the village will see that the grounds are properly taken care of.

There being no other business, the meeting adjourned.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT pursuant to a resolution duly adopted by the Village Board, a special election is called to be held in the Village of Mazomanie, Dane County, Wisconsin, on the 20th day of June, 1921.

That the purpose of said election is to pass upon and approve or disapprove the sale to Wisconsin River Power Company of the transmission line owned by the Village of Mazomanie and extending from the hydro-electric plant of Wisconsin River Power Company near Prairie du Sac, Wisconsin, into the Village of Mazomanie, together with the transformers and appurtenances used in connection with said transmission line; that it is proposed to sell the whole of said transmission line, transformers, appurtenances, etc. That a summary of the terms of the preliminary agreement of said sale entered into between the Village and Wisconsin River Power Company, and a statement of the terms and conditions upon which and the price at which it is proposed to make said sale are outlined in said preliminary agreement are as follows:

1. To sell to WISCONSIN RIVER POWER COMPANY, its transformers and appurtenances used in connection with the transmission line extending from the plant of WISCONSIN RIVER POWER COMPANY, near Prairie du Sac, Wisconsin, into the Village of MAZOMANIE, together with all transmission line equipment and right-of-way belonging to and used in connection with said transmission line.

2. To give a permit to WISCONSIN RIVER POWER COMPANY to maintain on the streets and alleys of the VILLAGE OF MAZOMANIE, to be hereinafter designated by Village Board of Trustees, a high tension transmission line.

3. To provide WISCONSIN RIVER POWER COMPANY, without cost, suitable and sufficient land in said VILLAGE OF MAZOMANIE, on which WISCONSIN RIVER POWER COMPANY may erect and maintain a suitable sub-station.

4. To devote the purchase price received from WISCONSIN RIVER POWER COMPANY to the payment of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000) par value of bonds issued by the VILLAGE OF MAZOMANIE, and now outstanding, which were issued for the purpose of defraying the cost of said transmission line.

5. To accept payment of the consideration of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000) in partial of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) per annum with interest at the rate of five percent (5%) per annum, and to pay the principal serially at the rate of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) per year at such times as to enable the VILLAGE OF MAZOMANIE, to pay the interest and maturing principal on Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000) of bonds now outstanding as above stated.

6. To modify the contract which it now has with the VILLAGE OF MAZOMANIE, for the delivery of electrical energy so that said contract shall provide for the delivery of electricity to the VILLAGE OF MAZOMANIE, at the sub-station in Mazomanie, but that there shall be no change in the price per K. W. hour, in said contract.

7. To purchase the three transformers which the VILLAGE OF MAZOMANIE has ordered from General Electric Company, but which have not yet been delivered, and to pay for such transformers at the time and in the manner agreed upon by the VILLAGE OF MAZOMANIE, with said General Electric Company, said transformers, after such payment, to be and remain the property of WISCONSIN RIVER POWER COMPANY.

8. To make the necessary change in the transmission line to enable the Villages of Black Earth, Cross Plains, and Mount Horeb, to receive electrical energy as they now receive it and to relieve the VILLAGE OF MAZOMANIE from any further obligation to said villages on account of the transfers of said transmission line to WISCONSIN RIVER POWER COMPANY.

9. To make the necessary changes to enable the delivery of electrical energy to Halfway Prairie Creamery and Farmers Electric Association as now called for by the contract between the said Halfway Prairie Creamery and the VILLAGE OF MAZOMANIE.

That said election is to be held at the Village Hall in said Village of Mazomanie. The polls of said election will be opened at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, and be closed at five-thirty o'clock in the evening of said day.
