Dane County Permanently Organized.

Representatives of the township Farm Bureaus permanently organized in Dane county during the past two weeks, following the membership caucuses held earlier in the season, met at the Wisconsin Rural Experiment station's headquarters, Tuesday afternoon, August 9th, and perfected the permanent organization of the Dane County Farm Bureau.

Chris J. Schroefer, of the state Farm Bureau, addressed the meeting and outlined a tentative program for the new permanent county organization's immediate activities.

Officers elected to serve the organization until its first regular annual meeting to take place next January, are Otto F. Toepfer, president, Madison township; J. E. O'Malley, vice-president, Westport township; Verley Pollard, secretary-treasurer, Burke township. The presidents of the organized townships constitute the Board of Directors.

The organization now has 500 members.

OF LOCAL INTEREST

—Misses Annie and Ida Morrill, Rose and Genevieve Power; Vera Gora, Laura Parman, Olive Reeve, Violet Garford, Clara Kerr, Frances Frieden, Mary Sutcliffe, Helen Lawa, and Gladys Carvey were among those from this place who attended the teachers' institute at Madison this week.

—Jedleville Chronicle: Prof. Harvey Jones has accepted an offer as instructor in agriculture in the Mazomanie high school and expects to move his family to that village about September 1. Mr. Jones will be well qualified for the position, having conducted that branch of education in our local high school during seven of the eleven years he taught here.

—The Wisconsin state debt, created principally for war purposes, as evidenced by certificates of indebtedness, totals \$2,675,591.77, according to the report of the secretary of state. Of this amount, \$1,163,700 is due to the normal school fund, to add to the state is indebted to the university fund for \$111,000 and to the Agricultural college fund for \$60,000.

—At a regular meeting of Madison Assembly, E. F. U., it was decided to hold a picnic at Moonlight Park, comprising all of the assembly in Dane County, at which time an effort will be made to make this an annual affair and general "get together good time." The picnic will be held on Sunday August 21st and will be in the nature of a basket picnic, to which all members of the E. F. U. are invited.

—A net profit of 36.3 per cent. was made by seven large representative milk companies in Milwaukee, Madison, Racine, Eau Claire, and Kenosha during the past year, the report of N. C. Hall, accountant for the department of markets, shows. Investigation of the companies brought out that they sold milk aggregating \$11,722,911, with a net profit, before deducting income taxes, of \$513,152, and after, \$250,084.

The new statewide minimum wage order of the industrial commission became effective August 1st, and applies to all employers of women and minors and to all women employees as well as to boys under twenty-one years. The minimum rate for adult women employees and for minors over seventeen

years who have had six months or more of experience in any trade or industry is 25 cents an hour in cities which in 1920 had a population of 5,000 or more, and elsewhere 22 cents an hour. The rate for inexperienced employees during the first three months in any industry is 18 cents an hour and during the second three months 20 cents an hour. Minors between fourteen and sixteen years must be paid not less than 10 cents an hour during

thereafter. Minors between sixteen and seventeen years must be paid 10 cents an hour if they have not yet had six months of experience in the industry, and 20 cents an hour after that time.
