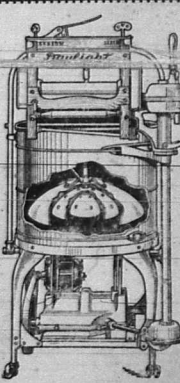

Several complaints have reached this office of children entering gardens and yards indiscriminately and picking flowers that the householder has been at great pains to raise—many times for a purpose. ## HUMANE FISHING.

Humane Thought, by A. E. Frederick, State Humane Officer.

"God created... every living creature."—Genesis.

Even a fish is the creature of God. And though its nervous system may not be as finely developed as that of higher animals, yet it may suffer pain.

In accepting the rather universal but wrong idea that the fish is insensible to pain when hooked and torn at the mouth and that its prolonged death outside of the water is without suffering, many well-meaning people have unknowingly committed many acts of real cruelty.

Most of us love to fish. Humane work in no wise precludes this sport as inhumane. It even suggests the thought that even fishing should be made to conform as far as possible to the general humane idea of eliminating as much suffering as possible. Fishing may be carried on in a humane way.

As soon as caught, fish should be killed by a blow on the back of the head with a stick or any hard instrument; or the fish may be held in the hand and its head struck against something hard. Such a blow will cause instant death, avoiding prolonged suffering.

Artificial bait is likewise recommended. The live minnow and frog pierced by the hook suffer untold agony, while

that fish which are thus killed have a better flavor and form a better quality of food than those which die slowly and suffer.
