#### Saved a Life by Killing the Line.

Bitter Sickle  
The outage which lasted from 12:30  
to 12:35 p. m. on June 7 was on account  
of the fact that a man came in contact  
with live wires at Beach Park. The  
telephone operator at Beach Park

and notified him of the fact and re-  
quested that the power be cut off. In  
response to this request the switch  
was opened at Prairie du Sac, killing  
the line, and I am informed that the  
prompt action on the part of the tele-  
phone operator and the response of  
our operator at Prairie du Sac resulted  
in saving the life of the man who had  
come in contact with the wires.

I feel that our customers should  
know what caused this outage, and that  
a life was endangered and that, as a  
result of depriving the people of power  
for this short interval, it was possible  
to rescue a man who was in a danger-

#### Mrs. William Steffen.

Mrs. Hannah Steffen was born in  
Germany, October 5, 1855; came to  
this country with her parents in 1867,  
and settled in Neosho. In 1874 her  
parents moved to Reedsburg, Wis., but  
Mrs. Steffen spent her girlhood days  
around Neosho. January 4, 1878, she  
was married to William Steffen. They  
came directly to Mazomanie, and have  
made their home here ever since. One  
daughter was born to them, who died  
in infancy.

Mrs. Steffen was taken ill about the  
first of April. A complication of dis-  
eases set in, and all that medical skill  
and loving hands could do was of no  
avail. She passed to be with her Maker  
Friday evening, June 9, 1922, at 9:30,

Abels, of Vancouver, Wash., and Mrs.

Truly it can be said of her, none knew  
her but to love her, none named her  
but to praise. She was of a bright and  
sunny disposition, always wearing a  
smile. She was a beautiful Christian  
woman, regular attendant at the means  
of grace. Her one aim in life was to  
be a true and loyal soldier of Jesus  
Christ. Her implicit faith in Jesus  
was made manifest on her death bed  
many times, telling her loving husband  
she was willing and ready to meet her  
Lord. Her death had no dread. She went  
peacefully asleep smiling in the arms  
of Jesus. Good night, Mrs. Steffen,  
we will see you in the morning.

The funeral was held from the home  
the M. E. church, Tuesday afternoon,

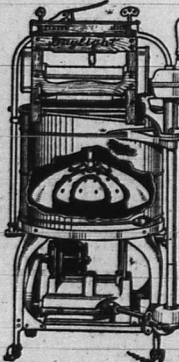

## OF LOCAL INTEREST

—Miss Clara Loepel, of Washington, D. C., Misses Katherine Loepel and Helen Viegler, of Portland, Oregon, arrived here, Thursday evening, and are visiting with Mr. and Mrs. Jos. E. Gillette and family.

—The Dane County Medical society voted Tuesday night at the meeting in Stouten to close offices Saturday afternoon. This action came as a result of much agitation on the part of many of the doctors of the society.

—A "shower" was given for Miss Emma Carwell, of Richland Center, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Trager, Wednesday evening, at which twelve of her friends at this place were present. Miss Carwell is to be married June 21.

—Scalded when he fell into a tub of boiling water as he was playing about the house, Vincent Parid, eight years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. Anton Parid, of Madison, died at a hospital, Tues-

day. The tub was placed on the floor while preparations for washing clothes were being made by his mother.

—O. B. Clevin, a farmer in the town of Burke, filed voluntary bankruptcy proceedings in the office of the clerk of the federal court at Madison, Wednesday. His assets were listed at \$11,000 and liabilities at \$11,000. Real estate and cattle are listed in the assets.

—Revocation proceedings were held at Madison, Saturday, in the case of Dr. Simon C. Keller, of Sauk City, before Louis J. Brinkman, of Milwaukee, legal advisor for the prohibition department. Dr. Keller was charged with promiscuous issuing of liquor prescriptions.

—A cyclone, which swept away more than a dozen small buildings, and a large barn, uprooted shade trees, and damaged numerous orchards struck the town of Westport in this county, about eleven o'clock Saturday forenoon. The large barn on the Vinne (Malley) farm was blown down, and two tobacco sheds laid flat.

—Mrs. John McKee, Mrs. H. F. Rohr, Mrs. Anna Roche, Mrs. Emma Rlenow, Mrs. Flora Reece, Mrs. Vivian Chatfield, Mrs. Elmer Segelbrecht, Mrs. Albert Showers, Mrs. M. T. Caldwell, Mrs. Frank Little, and Mrs. Frank Holmstrom attended the Sauk County W. C. T. U. convention at Merrimack, on Wednesday, making the trip in two cars, driven by Mrs. Chatfield and Mrs. Segelbrecht.

—Tom Lazarri, on whose farm near Howe was found a hidden vault containing twenty-five gallons of moonshine and fifty gallons of wine when the county sheriff and prohibition agents raided it last Friday night, was fined \$200 by Judge A. C. Hoggmann in superior court at Madison, Tuesday, when he changed his plea to guilty. He has the alternative of spending four months in the county jail.

—The largest class in the history of the Mazomanie high school, 1,244 graduates, was conferred at the annual commencement exercises, with the 325 degrees, diplomas, and certificates that have been conferred during the year since last June, the total number of graduates for the year is 1,567.

—The William B. Cairns Post, American Legion, of Madison, received a letter from Glen L. Booth, commander of the Mickelsons-Martin post, of Black Earth, referring to the case of a disabled veteran, which was brought to the attention of Joe Duizert, county chairman of the service drive. The veteran was completely disabled, and had his compensation revoked last fall. Stanley K. Bernard, service officer and Red Cross worker, succeeded in reinstating compensation, and in getting back pay from November 1, 1921.

—William Corascott, of Madison, convicted a year ago of obtaining money under false pretenses from Mrs. E. R. Petherick, was sentenced to three years in the state penitentiary at Waupun, by Judge A. C. Hoggmann, last Friday, in superior court. The sentence follows the conviction of a supreme court to set aside the conviction. Corascott is said to have obtained \$1,100 by giving his note and worthless stock for securities owned by Mrs. Petherick. He is at liberty on \$10,000 bail, on a stay of execution granted by the supreme court pending action on a writ of error.
