Income Taxes

State income tax reports will soon be mailed from the office of the assessor of incomes. If a blank is not received by February 10, a request should be made to the Assessor of Incomes.

Every single person who receives an income of \$800 a year and all married persons who together receive \$1200 should file state reports. In addition, every person who is sent a blank by the Assessor of Incomes must fill out the same and return it whether he has a taxable income or not.

Assessments must be made in writing before March 1.

All dividends and interest must be reported as income whether received from Wisconsin property or not. There are no tax free bonds under the Wisconsin law except obligations of the federal government. Interest and dividends must be reported whether from property located within or without the state.

All persons who are making Wisconsin their home on the first of January are liable for assessment upon all of their income of the preceding year whether earned in Wisconsin or not. Teachers should report their full salaries received even though some of

it may have been earned in another state.

Partnerships are taxed under the Wisconsin Income Tax Law. Partners are allowed to deduct as expenses a reasonable amount of salary to each partner but this must be accounted for on their individual returns.

It is very important that the towns, village or city in which the taxpayer resides and pays his taxes be correctly given on the return.
