## Letter From Oregon.

La Pine, Oregon, May 25, 1923.

My dear Mr. Swan:

Many times last winter while in El Paso, Texas, I thought with sympathy of friends in Wisconsin. The clear-blue sky and warm bright sunshine that I was then enjoying was such a contrast to the cold and snow which I associate with winters in the Northwest.

To me the climate of El Paso is almost perfect for nine months of the year. The summer is too intensely hot.

The city itself is picturesque. On the north side the Franklin range of mountains, bare except for rocks, small shrubs and cactus. The city spreads out between those mountains and the Rio Grande River that separates it from the city of Juarez, Mexico. Another range of mountains back of Juarez makes the boundary line of our horizon to the south.

One day I took a street car ride across a bridge and saw a little of that Mexican city. In fact El Paso

itself has many Mexican people and Spanish is heard on every hand, and there are many evidences of that old race and language.

The American people have come from all parts of the Union, here largely by the climate.

In the Congregational church I attended there were several families from Wisconsin.

The business portion of El Paso has some large fine buildings and there are long avenues of stately southern mansions with their ample lawns and beautiful gardens.

The majority of streets have small but attractive bungalows with climbing rose or vine covered porches. Many are rented furnished to transients who come to El Paso for their health.

The street car system is ample and makes an always convenient and inexpensive way of getting to any part of the city, from the Smelter on the west to Fort Bliss on the east, or from the river to the highlands.

There is no good health. I left just enjoying a pretty bungalow into which we moved in April. It is convenient, well located and not far from the school where our little Doris attends. I am now with some old Spanish friends on a ranch in a clearing out last year. We are thirty-seven miles from the railroad, in a yellow pine district where lumber is the principal asset.

The summer season is too short for much grain or garden and hay for the cattle is the farmer's chief concern. It is a good dairy region. Many raise sheep and goats.

In the family where I am, a son was named for Mr. Crawford and a daughter for me.

The Mother is the Superintendent of the Sunday School at La Pine, five miles from the home.

I feel very far away, but I am glad to be for a time in this happy household. During the past few months I have suffered with many ailments since the death of my

—The First National bank of Highland was closed late Monday by National Bank Examiner Earl W. Moon, Rock Island, following a special examination which has been under way for several months. It is the second bank in this section of the state to be closed during the past week, the People's State bank of Lancaster, Grant county, having been closed Saturday. Examiner Moon declined to make a statement as to the bank's solvency or the condition of its accounts. Shortage in the accounts of the People's State bank of Lancaster may reach \$50,000 it was indicated Tuesday, although state banking officials declined to make a definite statement before the checking-up is completed. Depositors of the bank are planning to make up a sum of \$500 as a reward for A. A. Clark, vice president, and J. Harold Pugh, cashier, of the bank who have been missing since the institution was closed by the state banking department Saturday. Tuesday afternoon Charles H. Basford, former president of the bank, was arrested on complaint of District Attorney Clementson, charged with having stolen \$11,500 of the bank's funds March 28, 1922. Clark


