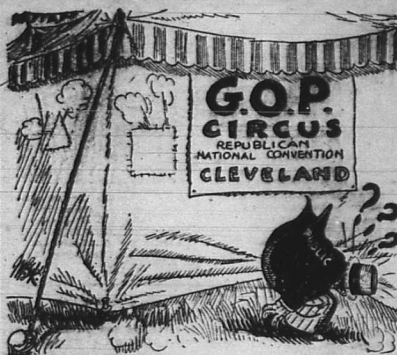
Nineteen Receive Diplomas

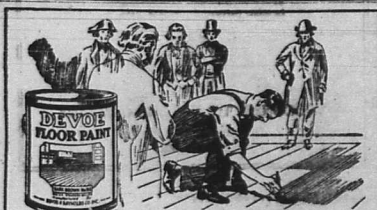

No Discount On Licenses For Old Cars

Automobile owners who are waiting to license their cars after June 30, when they expect to get a discount of twenty-five per cent, will be disappointed, according to a statement issued by Fred R. Zimmerman, Secretary of State. The discount applies to new cars only and the applicant will be required to make an affidavit that the car in question has not been used this year prior to July 1. Mr. Zimmerman also calls attention to the fact that the provision for discount goes into effect after June 30, and not June 1. Much confusion and delay has been caused in the Department of State by applicants who have been misinformed about this provision. The reverse side of the application card gives the correct dates for discount.

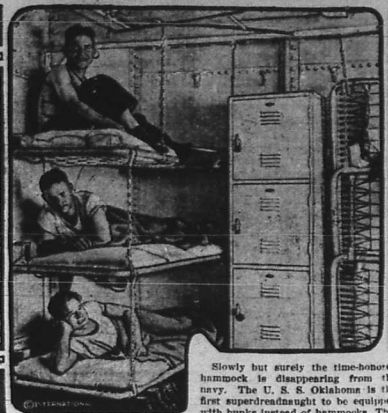

Western Dane Continues To Hold The Banner

On Friday, June 6, the second annual field and health day for Dane County schools was held at Vitas Park. In the forenoon Rural School commencement exercises were held in the auditorium of the Central High School. One hundred seventy-two graduates came from Western districts and about the same number from the Eastern. A. Thompson of the State Department gave the commencement address. The auditorium was filled to overflowing.

The program in Vitas Park in the afternoon was the climax of the play days which have been held this spring in each township throughout the county. The winners in each event at each play-day were present to compete with Eastern Dane. Some of the events which were on the program were running races, three-legged races, sack races, wheelbarrow races, sulcatie - race, potato race, tug-of-war, and base ball games.

Western Dane proved itself superior over Eastern Dane by a score of 125 points to Eastern Dane's 122. Western Dane won the two base ball games played by the rural teams and the state graded school teams. In the first by a score of 7 to 9 and in the second by a score of 5 to 4. The rural school team was made up of four from the Forward School, three from the Malone School, one from the Oak Hall School and one from the Prairie View School. The Black Earth State Graded School team played the Eastern Dane State Graded School.

Another of the big features of the day was the health parade, in which every township in the county was represented. Each school aimed to represent some health feature by a float, health fairies, vegetable groups, milk drinking brigades, etc. The first prize was awarded by the Yellow School, Middleton, and the second prize was awarded to the Badger School, town of Madison. The third prize going to the Blackwoods School of Eastern Dane. Health cup was awarded to Eastern Dane.

SODOM

By THOMAS A. CLARK
Dean of Men, University of Illinois.

"And Lot pitched his tent toward Sodom," the historian wrote when narrating events connected with the early settlers in the Orient. Lot was a nephew of Abraham, and a nephew of a boy who had been well brought up, and Sodom was beautifully situated in a green, fertile valley with a view of the mountains in the distance.

The town had its attractions, and Lot was human. It was, however, what in these modern days we should call a wide-open town. There was no attempt to enforce the Volstead act, traffic laws were loose and the dances were unchaperoned. The young people were friendly and unconventional, the sort that takes pride in the fact that they know how to take care of themselves. The vaudeville shows were snappy; all of the pool halls allowed gambling devices; and it was easy to pick up a female acquaintance on the street. When anything happened the policemen and the mayor were always safely out of the way and employed, themselves harmlessly in any following in looking for a rope. There was something doing in Sodom most of the time, and it was, in fact, a very interesting place. Lot found it so.

But he found also, as every man before or since has ultimately found, that you can't play it safe without getting sold by it. You can't even look on and keep absolutely aloof from it. Finally it touches you. You be at first to justify it and then take part in it. Sodom went up in flames consumed by the fire of its own lust for evil pleasure, and though Lot escaped, he was scorched; he carried with him the marks of contact with the low and vulgar and profane. He was not the same man that he was before he had gazed upon the corruption of Sodom.

That was six thousand years ago of course, and in our health land, but there are still Sodoms - modern, alluring and so cleverly camouflaged as to seem quite harmless - toward which the well-intentioned young fellow, or his sister even, may look with interest or desire, or may pitch his tent. It is easy and often interesting to treat lightly the religious principles which we once followed, to drop them the unconventional, to play a few hands of poker, or to bet on the game, to go gradually from the risqué to the vulgar and finally to the immoral. Lot had no intention of taking up the habits of the Sodomites. He was curious. He simply wanted to see what it was all like. I'm sure he felt that he was quite able to take care of himself. But Sodom was mistaken, and so is anyone who plays with evil or temporizes with sin.
