Mrs. Mary Ann Petherick, widow of E. P. Petherick, veteran newspaperman, died Saturday night at a Madison hospital after a long illness. She was born at Mazomanie, August 21, 1858. Her parents were Mr. and Mrs. Nathaniel T. Davies. Mr. Petherick, known as "Uncle Dick," died May 13, 1914. He was one of the best known old newspapermen in the state. He had been connected with editorial staffs of Milwaukee and Madison papers.

The remains of Mrs. Petherick were removed to the Fitch funeral parlors. Funeral services were held at 2:30 Tuesday afternoon at Grace Episcopal church, at Madison. The Rev. William Dawson officiating. Interment was made in Forest Hill cemetery.
