Van Worden announced winner of the first fall and in the second bout Van Worden was injured and forced to quit. Van Worden is a "good, clean, hard working wrestler" and gave Demetral one of the hardest fights he ever had. It is a good match for Demetral and deserves a lot of credit. If he would not have been injured, it is doubtful as to what the outcome of this match would be.

The Brown vs. Jewell bout was won by Dan Brown, a boxer and welterweight wrestling champion of the state. Earl Jewell, of Blue Mounds, got the first fall and Brown the second and third. Jewell is a good clever wirey wrestler, and gave Brown a real battle, but the referee, Van Worden, of Milwaukee was to heavy for him. Give Jewell something of his own weight and he will whip it in wild-cats.

Next Wednesday, October 8, Demetral will wrestle Tommy Cannon, middleweight champion of Michigan, and Brown will wrestle George Olson of Black Earth.

## OBITUARY

### Mrs. Orville Perkins

Martha Emma Lockwood was born in the town of Black Earth, January 20, 1872. She was the daughter of Charles and "Missabel" Lockwood. Her early life was spent in the town of Black Earth.

In the year of 1893, October 25th, she was united in marriage to Orville Perkins, of Janesville. To this union was born seven children, six of whom are living. One son, Roscoe, preceded her in death in 1918. The surviving children are: Grant, Vermont, and Dwight, of Black Earth; Charlotte (now Mrs. Jack Schutt), of Milwaukee; Leola, Chester and Curtis at home.

The first two years of her married life were spent at Janesville, then moving to Barneveld, where she lived for eighteen years. The remainder of her life was spent in the vicinity of Black Earth.

Besides the sorrowing husband and children and three grandchildren, she leaves to mourn her death, three sisters and four brothers: Mrs. Mary Dunaway, Mrs. Annie Schick, Mrs. Eliza Turk, George and Alfred, of Black Earth; James and John Lockwood, of Mazomanie. Also one aunt, Miss Sarah Hawley, of Mazomanie, had many other relatives, besides a host of friends. One sister, Mrs. Lizzie Sharratt, died several years ago.

Mrs. Perkins united with the Methodist church in her early life and was always a firm believer in Christ.

In September, 1923, she underwent a serious operation. Three months later it was necessary for her to submit to a second operation from which she never recovered. All that medical skill and loving hands could do was done, but to no avail, and after more than a year of constant suffering, which she bore cheerfully and patiently, she quietly fell asleep at her home, Monday, at 5:30 a. m., September 29, 1924.

Mrs. Perkins was a devoted wife and mother. Her truest joys were those of appreciation and thought for others. She will be sadly missed in the home and community, but although a place is vacant, her influence will remain forever.
