Many people use honey for sweetening breakfast foods and fresh fruits, especially berries, grapefruit, oranges and baked apples. It gives tea, lemonade and fruit punches a mellowness of flavor and smoothness that is delightful. Honey ice cream sundae may be made by pouring honey over ice cream and sprinkling chopped nuts.

Housewives use honey for canning fruits, making jellies, preserves, and marmalades. It has preserving qualities and also improves the flavor. Bread, cakes and cookies baked with a small amount of honey—keeping fresh and moist for months and will actually improve in flavor the longer they are kept.

Honey is a heat and energy producing food of great value. It is sometimes called a "pre-digested" sweet, as the changes which the nectar undergoes in becoming honey are practically the same as the changes taking place in the digestion of sugar. Thus honey can be used directly by anybody without complex digestive processes. This makes it a desirable sweet for children because less work is required of the digestive system.

Honey contains small amounts of protein and minerals, which are not found in commercial sugars. Small amounts of all mineral substances required by the body are found in honey. It also contains vitamins, which are so essential to proper growth and development. Science has proven that bacteria which cause typhoid fever, dysentery, and other human diseases cannot live in honey. It is therefore sure to be free of such disease germs. Honey week is November 16 to 22.

Mammoth Preparations For Twenty-
Fifth "International" Show

The management of the International
Live Stock Exposition is making
great preparations for the staging
of the quarter-centennial celebration
of this world-famous educational in-

stitution at the Chicago Union Stock
Yards, November 29th to December
29th. From advanced indications, this
will be the largest gathering of the
agricultural interests of America ever
brought together and many special oc-
casions will mark this history-making
event. Every one interested in any
way in the basic industry should make
a special effort to attend this great
round-up of the agrarian resources of
the continent and enjoy a week of
pleasure and profit at the metropolis.

In commemoration of the impor-
tance of this event, Congress, by spe-
cial act, has authorized the United
States Department of Agriculture to
award official medals to all winners
of first prizes and championships in
the live stock competitions at the
coming show. The Department itself
will fill an entire exhibit hall with
a display of its various lines of ac-
tivity. President Coolidge and other
high government officials are expected
to be present during the Exposition.

The International Live Stock Ex-
position will be "international" in
character as well as in name. In addition
to the Canadian exhibits and dele-
gations, several foreign countries are ex-
pected to be represented. Three fam-
ous live stock judges are coming from
Great Britain and one from the Ar-
gentine to act as arbiters in the var-
ious contests among breeders and
feeders.

Brilliant evening entertainments
will be held each night in the arena,
featuring a society horse show and a
program of exciting and entertaining
events. There will be something of
interest and value during the Inter-
national for every member of the fam-
ily, both urban and rural dwellers.
Reduced railroad rates will be in
effect during the week of the show.
