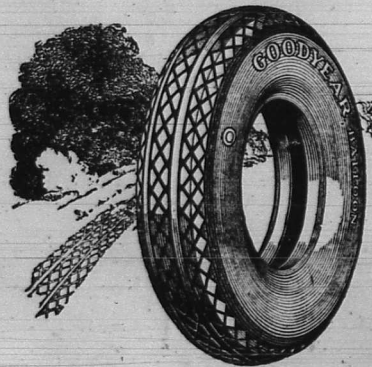

MILWAUKEE RAILROADS SAFETY RECORD.

The Milwaukee Railroad reports a decrease of seven per cent in crossing accidents in 1926 compared with 1925. For the United States as a whole there was an increase of over eight per cent in grade crossing accidents.

"The favorable showing along the Milwaukee Road" says Mr. H. E. Byram, co-receiver of that line, "indicates that the public in this section of the country is responding to our constant efforts to protect life and limb."

The number of automobiles struck by trains and the number of trains struck by autos each decreased about six per cent.

In 1925 one hundred and sixty-four automobiles ran into our trains, striking them anywhere between the cab and the engine. Last year there were one hundred and fifty-three cases of this kind. Apparently automobile drivers are becoming more careful in approaching the rails.

The year 1926 rounded out the seventh year without a fatal injury to a passenger in a train accident on the Milwaukee Road.
