TO ALL HOLDERS OF SECOND LIBERTY LOAN BONDS

NOTICE OF REDEMPTION

All outstanding Second Liberty Loan 4 per cent bonds of 1917-42 (issued 4%) and all outstanding Second Liberty Loan Government 4 1/2 per cent bonds of 1917-42 (issued 4 1/2%) are called for redemption on November 15, 1927, pursuant to the terms of their issue. Interest on all second 4's and second 4 1/2's will cease on said redemption date, November 15, 1927.

Holders of Second 4's and Second 4 1/2's will be entitled to have the bonds redeemed and paid at par on November 15, 1927. Such holders may, however, in advance of November 15, 1927, be offered the privilege of exchanging all or part of their bonds for other interests of the United States Government. Holders who desire to avail themselves of the exchange privilege, if and when announced, should request their bank or nearest money dealer to notify them when information regarding the exchange offering is received.

Further information may be obtained from any Federal Reserve Bank or branch, or from the Commissioner of the Public Debt, Treasury Department, Washington.

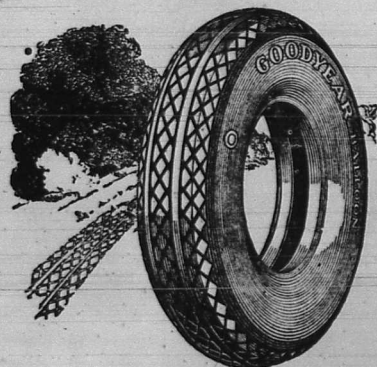

Section 1.
